## Hear Ye! Hear Ye!



# Vital Statistics of Epsom, New Hampshire 1727-1927 Released

The book, by William Haslet Jones, has been published by Heritage Books. Some 7,500 names are contained in the book in alphabetical order in three catagories - births, deaths and marriages. In addition to this data are listings of Epsom Town Officers, the Epsom Town Charter, a list of those signing the Association Test, and those with war service in the Revolution and the War of 1812. All the vital statistics give source codes for reference. Several members of the Epsom Historical Association have ordered copies, and Mr. Jones kindly has sent one to the Epsom Public Library.

"Tues. 26 (October 1852) - Went to Epsom with Dea. Foss, to attend our Q.M. Attended the ministers meeting in the A.M. and the Q.M. Conference in the P.M. and put up with Br N. Bickford.

Wed. 27 - Br Cook, preached the first sermon. In the P.M. Sermon by E. Place from Heb. 12:1,2. As no young man could be found to attend an appointment which Br Quimby had made Some 4 miles from the place of holding the Q.M. I volunteered, and went to the new Rye neighbourhood where I met a learge congregation. Some good people, and some very bad. When I went up into the desk, I soon came in contact with a learge brass pin fastened point upwards in the bottom of my Chair. I was So fortunate as not to receive any Serious injury, but it was some time before I could find Strength enough in my fingers to bend down the point out of my way. I went on with my meeting as if nothing had happened & preached from the parable of the Prodigal son. And if the Rowdies in that place did not have their due, I will pay the ballence the first opportunity that presents. But I presume that they had rather pass receits as it now Stands, than to have any more of the coin of truth from the gospel mint.
