TOWN FOREST & CONSERVATION AREA TOPIC FOR MARCH MEETING

Sunday afternoon, March 21 at pm will be the time the Epsom Historical Association resumes its schedule of programs for the year. Our guest this day will be Ron Klemarzyk from the Forest Resource Consultants (FORECO). Ron has worked closely with the Epsom Conservation Commission in establishing the town forst and as our town forester. This region, on the Tarlton Road, was once a thriving community, often referred to as "New Porstmouth", and was home by 1863 for up to as many as 20 families. One hundred years later there were only three homes still suitable to live in, and now that number is even lower. The history of this part of Epsom remains a mystery to many, but descendants of those of Cofran, Dowst, Griffin, Foss, Babb, Wells, Langley, Appleton, Dickey, Hill. Nelson and Ames, all have ties there. In this area once flourished mills, and sections of the area were named after its inhabitants - places such as Sand Hill, Allen Hill, Simeon's Gulch and Mountain Brook. Once in this area were at least one, and perhaps more (as some of us suspect) burying grounds, large fertile fields and running brooks.

Mr. Klemarzyk will speak on the process of mapping, locating natural and historical features, such as cellar holes, wells, cemeteries, dams, mill sites, waterways, ledges and stone walls. These have been used to develop several walking trails. He and many volunteers have cleared brush from the top of the land to open up the view of the northern mountains.

Small maps of the area will be available at the meeting. Whether you wish to re-familiarize yourself with this important part of Epsom's past, or have recollections and information relative to the people and places of the Tarlton Road, this informative meeting won't want to be missed!

The Epsom Early Settlers website can be found through the US GenWeb project - New Hampshire - Merrimack, CO.


WHO IS BURIED IN THE TARLTON CEMETERY?

One stone remains standing in the Tarlton Cemetery, and on it is William Tarlton 1763-1847, followed by a list of other family members - no dates. It probably is a replacement stone added about 1920. Through some research, these are the people listed on the stone and their relationship to William Tarlton:

Lucretia (Amazeen) wife of William (died 1849)
Comfort (Wallace) wife of son William
children of William Tarlton² and Comfort

Mary Abigail John E. Dennis

William Tarlton² remarried after the death of his first wife Comfort and is buried in the rear of the Brackett-Libbey Cemetery.
