REPORT

OF THE

SCHOOL BOARD OF THE TOWN OF EPSOM,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1888.

By the statutes of our state it becomes our duty, as your servants for the direction and promotion of the cause of education, to place before you a report of our schools. Formerly it was the custom of school committees to report each school separately, and often to praise or denounce the teachers thereof as duty or fancy dictated. Such reports often influenced prudential committees in their selections of teachers. We might make just criticisms of some of our teachers the past year, and of others we could justly speak Words of commendation, but who would be benefitted by such a course? The occasion for these criticisms and comments are known to the school board, a majority of which, serving another year, can be governed accordingly in their selection of teachers. Therefore, personal comments of teachers, whether favorable or unfavorable, arc withheld. We occasionally found it necessary to criticise and advise a few of our teachers, and these criticisms and this advice were kindly received; and, we trust, proved beneficial to teachers and pupils.

Greenleaf's Mathematical Series, Inductive Course, has been introduced into all our schools the past year, in place of the old series, copyrighted in 1842, and which had been in constant use in our schools some twenty-six years. The great benefit arising from the change is manifest in all our schools. A similar change is also much needed in the text-book on geography. "Any town or any district, at

any lawful meeting, may raise money, by taxation or otherwise, for supplying the scholars in the common schools with suitable school books free of charge." We think the interests of our schools would be subserved by availing ourselves of the privileges of the law, and having the town pay the expenses of the exchange instead of the pupils or the patrons of the schools.

It has often happened that committees, feeling the importance of an exchange and recommending it, have been disappointed to find, perhaps, a third or one-half of the pupils refusing to heed the recommendation, and continuing to use the objectionable book, causing a multiplicity of classes and consequent confusion. Should the committee insist, as he clearly has the right to, that the pupils must make the exchange recommended it would only tend to "make confusion more confused, "for" when men *must* they *won't.*" These difficulties would all be obviated by the district's bearing the expenses of all needful exchanges of text-books, and much valuable time would be saved to our schools.

On the whole our schools have been very successful the past year, and good progress has been made in all the branches taught. Though much has been accomplished, yet there remains much more to be accomplished. The work of improvement should steadily advance. To this end parents and citizens generally should give the entire weight of their influence to the cause. By correct moral training of children at home, by teaching them self-respect and respect for their teachers, by sustaining teachers in their efforts to maintain order and decorum in their schools, by enforcing habits of punctuality and close application to study parents and citizens may do much toward elevating our schools and making them what they were designed to be—nurseries of intelligence and morality.

The whole number of different scholars attending school

during the year is 170—number of boys. 90; number of girls, 80.

The number of children in town between the ages of 5 and 15 years, by selectmen's enumeration in April, 1887, is : boys, 68; girls, 63.

For length of schools, names and wages of teachers, number of scholars in each school, and average attendance, etc., you are referred to a tabular statement on another page, all of which we trust may receive your careful attention and we hope approval.
