## SCHOOL REPORT.

The wheels of time having performed another revolution, by the statutes of our state it becomes the duty of your School Board to report the condition of our schools and give an account of their stewardship.

We take pleasure in reporting more schooling the past year than it has been our privilege to have within the same space of time at any former period. As a rule our teachers have been excellent ones and there is good reason to feel assured that the educational interests of the district are in a prosperous condition and that during the past year whatever particular exceptions there may have been to success, there has been encouraging progress and in many cases decided advancement.

Recitation and Deportment Cards have been used in all of our schools which have caused parents to take a more lively interest in school matters and stimulated scholars to make greater effort than usual in their studies and to be more constant in attendance at school. Yet the eyils of tardiness and inconstancy have not been wholly overcome and too little interest on the part of many parents has been manifested in our schools. "Punctuality is a prime virtue anywhere" but in our schools it is essential to success. Pupils cannot learn or be instructed when absent. It has been said that "one day's absence is two days lost and one tardiness is half a day lost." If this be true you would be astonished at the amount of time lost to some of your children. Usually it should not be left optional with the child whether he shall attend school or not. Parents and guardians should have absolute control in this respect and should exercise this control. No parent should allow a child to forsake his school because he has merited and received punishment. If he has left the school he should in a majority of cases be corrected with the rod or counsel or both and returned to the school. The parent that

does not do this teaches the child lessons of misrule and insubordination which almost invariably bring down the hoary head with sorrow to the grave. Parents should satisfy themselves by frequent visits to the school-room in regard to the fitness of their teachers and of the progress made rather than by listening to the complaints of their children. The teacher's position is a trying one. Sustain him then by your influence and hearty co-operation and your schools will seldom prove failures.

Upon a careful examination of the leading text books on the subject of geography it was decided that Harper's is the best and at the commencement of the school year the series was introduced into all of our schools. The exchange has proved eminently satisfactory to teachers, pupils and parents.

Your School Board will mention three things that are very desirable for the best progress of our schools.

A school globe. It costs but little but is invaluable for the beginner in geography in giving him a visible idea of the shape of the earth, the lay of land and water, and with the teacher's explanation its position as a moving ball in the universe. By this a fog is dispelled in a few minutes from the beginner's mind through which it would blindly grope for weeks without this aid.

Mural outline maps hung upon the walls, containing the outlines of continents and countries, oceans and seas, lakes and rivers, etc., are important in giving the pupil both a broad and particular view of the surface of the globe on which we live and the positions of countries and places that are the objects of his study.

Worcester's or Webster's Unabridged Dictionary for reference. The school is the place for critical reading. Scholars criticise each other, and the teacher the scholars, and a good dictionary is very often necessary to decide cases and for information. Besides, the word being investigated while the interest is up, it will be better remembered afterward.

The whole number of different scholars attending school during the year is 125; number of boys, 80; number of girls, 75. The number of children in town between the ages of 5 and 15 years, by selectmen's enumeration in April, 1888, is boys, 63; girls, 58.

For length of schools, names and wages of teachers, number of scholars in each school, average attendance, etc., you are re-

ferred to a tabular statement on another page, all of which we trust may receive your careful attention, and we hope, approval.
