SCHOOL REPORT.

Another school year has passed and we, your servants, render an account of our stewardship to you. That we have made mistakes shows our frailty. In that we have succeeded proves our fidelity. When our schools prospered none appreciated it more than we and when they failed our depression was greatest. Owing to the severe illness of your superintendent the whole duty of visiting the winter schools and making this report has unexpectedly fallen upon another member of the board; and if inaccuracies appear herein we beg a charitable leniency as we shall depend for data upon the registers and the verbal suggestions of the superintendent and our own superficial observations in our casual visits to only a part of our schools during the year. The schools of the spring term were generally successful, while the fall term more than met our highest anticipations and we earnestly hoped that the winter term would prove equal to or, if possible, surpass both, but alas! an epidemic like the old Egyptian plagues suddenly swept through our land causing a panic not only in our, but in all schools insomuch that our largest schools became the smallest, and many of the scholars did not return, consequently some schools closed with less than one quarter of their registered number.

Your committee after a great deal of correspondence with different publishing houses of school supplies, were finally able to purchase 7 Worcester's Unabridged dictionaries (latest edition), 7 globes and 42 mural outline maps, which have been placed in the different school rooms in town, from the generous appropriation of one hundred dollars which you placed in our hands.

We took one month's advantage of a new law that provides free text books for all scholars and furnished by the town, the publishers offering to wait for their pay till the town should make an appropriation for this purpose. Acting under another new law that we might change any or all text books now in use, we introduced Harper's series of readers, Raub's grammars, Buckwalter's spelling book and Harper's series of Writing Books. We are unanimous that a new stimulous has been given to the pupils in the study of these new books. Please imagine, if you can, how irksome the same reading, grammar, arithmetic or geography lesson must be to a boy on some torrid day of June or frigid day of December conning his same task over and over term after term for the uneasiest part of his life, when he remembers that a new

jack-knife slumbers in his best pant's pocket only waiting for its owner to open its shining blade and carve out a miniature steam engine or wind mill that will perchance astonish the world if not himself. It is said that the infant mind contains the germ of every science: shall we not cultivate, nurture and interest it by every means in our power, lest it wither and die by our neglect. Somehow we have a big heap of sympathy for that restless, unquenchable spirit of boyhood. Pray let us not be parsimonious of every aid and encouragement to incite him to a noble manhood. The old question recurs, "if the child ask for bread will ye give him a stone?"

Let us now see if new books have wrought any changes. We found a class in the elementary grammar at the Center school that could analyze sentences and parse words better than many who have spent years studying grammar, although this was their first term in it. At New Rye a class of five readers can hardly be equaled as a class when we look into the register and find them all under eleven years of age. At New Orchard several had read nearly or quite through their new readers and the merry twinkle in their eyes as they read their parts was ample evidence that it was appreciated. At Short Falls a more advanced class in history and physiology did credit to themselves and teacher, though their books did not come till some weeks after the term had commenced. A class of three in primary geography made excellent progress in the North Road school but unfortunately this school had to be closed at the end of the sixth week, as so many scholars were sick and unable to attend. While we might mention classes in other schools which did well, we forbear lest some critic suggest our report be referred to a committee on mileage. Complaints, perhaps justly, have been made that writing has been too much neglected, but the last term with free writing books adapted to the wants of each has silenced in a great measure these complaints. A careful examination of the writing books at the close of the last term evinced unusual progress; the books at the Center and Gossville were models of neatness and penmanship. We are happy to state to those that oppose free text books that after our term's trial no book has been lost or injured but all have been accounted for and are in our possession. Written examinations were required in all our schools and the papers containing the answers were sent to the superintendent for inspection and ranking, and considering that this was their first attempt to *write* answers to questions sent by the committee, the result has been highly satisfactory imposing tasks so arduous upon all, both scholar and committee yet the discipline and self defence achieved has been a sufficient recompense. When these papers were returned to the scholars some of them received encouraging and complimentary praise from the superintendent and we are authorized to

say that under the faithful and thorough teaching of Miss Prescott the North Road school ranked highest. We have repeatedly urged the importance of punctual attendance and a large number had resolved not to be absent or tardy for the year, but by sickness were unable to be placed upon the perfect roll of honor. We give the names of those reported whose efforts nearly cost some of them their lives: Arthur Demers, absent only one half day, Guy T. Pike, Grace L. Woodman and M. Evangeline Brown. Your efforts have been duly appreciated by us and you have our sympathy.

The roll of honor will be unusually large but we shall print it hoping it will never be less.

Deportment cards have been sent weekly to you, parents and guardians, the past year and we believe the interest awakened amply encourages us to continue them and we hope that you will cheerfully sign and closely inspect them.

Four of our school houses are well adapted to school purposes while three are still needing repairs or should be disposed of and new ones built. The Short Falls school house needs better seats and desks and replastering, and the Mountain school house, if it is to be used for school purposes, should undergo thorough repairs; while the Gossville has good desks and seats, the building is wholly unfit for its 23 scholars, the room is dark and gloomy, the windows are just able to hold soul and body together by means of nails and putty and it stands in sad contrast with the well lighted and painted temple of worship a few rods distant.

The Fowler district has for the past two terms united with the Short Falls district under arrangements we hope satisfactory to all.

The Marden still continues with the Gossville. Under this arrangement we only support seven teachers.
