GENERAL REMARKS.

The school year of 1891 has closed, and in compliance with the statutes of our state, we hereby submit our annual reportand give an account of our stewardship.

Owing to the severe illness of our superintendent, the duty of making this report has unexpectedly fallen upon the other members of the board.

We shall not attempt to give as extensive a report as our chairman in all probability would have given, but we take great pleasure in reporting our schools in a very prosperous condition, and during the past year have been reasonably successful. We regret to report that on account of sickness, three of the winter terms had to be closed. At the Mountain, the whooping cough raged so badly, that only two pupils were able to attend, and the school closed, after keeping only four weeks. The North Road closed two weeks, and Short Falls one week, before the others in town.

As a rule our teachers have been excellent ones, and we think, with one or two exceptions, have given perfect satisfaction, as there has been very little complaint from parents. We, as a school board, highly commend them. They have fully met our most sanguine expectations.

Some of the schools excel in written arithmetic, showing thorough discipline. Others excel in reading. In general there has been good improvement in all studies pursued. One of our greatest obstacles we have to contend with is the irregular attendance of pupils. Every day that a scholar is absent makes a break in his or her studies, which can never be fully recovered, and is a great perplexity to the teacher. It has often been said, "Punctuality is a prime virtue anywhere." We think particularly so in school, and earnestly hope that parents will see the importance of their children being punctual.

It has been suggested that we have our school commence one month earlier in spring and close one month earlier in winter; that is, getting our school year between the 1st of April and the 1st of January. The great question has arisen

how shall all the scholars in the State have more equal school advantages. Dr. G. H. Towle, in his excellent report to the State Grange, suggested that the State raise a State School Tax to strengthen the school of country towns, which is worthy of a candid consideration by all educators of the State. Now, it is well known that many residents of the country towns own much property in our prosperous towns and cities of the state where it is taxed to increase their enormous school fund while the towns in which they reside is robbed of this Now we desire that all local granges in the state discuss this great question suggested by Dr. Towle and unitedly demand of the next legislature a remedy for this inequality. We would that every country school should have thirtyfive or forty weeks school for every district. Perhaps a change of statute law might give those towns a larger proportion of the literary money fund, whose school year has less than forty weeks, and thus equalize the number of weeks of country schools to nearer an average with city schools.

This would prevent parents going to the city to educate their children, or it might turn this tide, and the city parent go to the country to educate their children, and thus re-occupy our deserted farms.

It has not been our pleasure to visit all the schools at the close of each term, but our registers record 313 visitors. We are glad to see such an interest taken in our schools, and may the interest continue. Parents, your presence in the school room encourages teacher and pupil.
