STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the
[L. s.] *County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to*
vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town-house in said Epsom, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To choose three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Road Commissioners, Trustees of Public Library, Auditors, Collector of Taxes, and all other necessary Town Officers and Agents for the year ensuing.

Second. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools; for paying the town debts and defraying the interest thereon; for laying out and repairing highways and sidewalks and building bridges; for the maintenance of the poor; for defraying town charges; to establish and maintain public libraries; and for all other necessary charges arising in said town.

Third. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for George H. Hoyt Post, No. 66, G. A. R., for Memorial Day.

Fourth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair and improve the town cemetery.

Fifth. To hear the report of the Town Treasurer and Board of Selectmen to the Town Auditor; the report of the Auditor, Agents, Committees, and other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Sixth. To transact all other business which may come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

As soon as possible after our election as trustees we opened correspondence with the public library commissioners of the state with reference to the establishment of a library in this town. After having complied with the requirements of said commissioners by providing a suitable room, securing a competent person for librarian, arranged for the distribution of the books, etc., we received from them one hundred and five books, being the gift of one hundred dollars worth presented by the state.

Interested citizens have contributed the generous sum of sixty dollars for the purchase of books, which with the twenty-five dollars appropriated by the town, was expended in the purchase of one hundred and twenty-five volumes, and having been properly labeled and marked, were ready for distribution from the library room in George E. Warren's store building, Tuesday afternoon, September fifth, which has been opened every Tuesday afternoon since, under the supervision of our efficient librarian, Miss Elsie N. Warren.

Cards have been issued to one hundred and sixty-four different persons, who have taken from one to twenty books each, averaging fifty-two books each week.

In view of the above patronage already given, we ask your consideration of the question of making a larger appropriation, for the purpose of adding new books, than the twenty-five dollars appropriated by the vote of last year. We would also further appeal to the citizens and interested parties, and especially to former residents of the town for liberal contributions. We should be pleased to receive the present of books, which will be credited to the donors.

The reports of the various state officers that have been collecting in the offices of the town clerk and selectmen for many years, have been placed in the library, so that in all we have a library of three hundred and four volumes.

Several volumes of the Law Reports are missing, and if anyone should have taken them for reference, and neglected to return them, we would esteem it a favor if they would leave them at the library or with the trustees, as it is desirable that the set be complete.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The school board having attended to the duties of their office, make to the town their annual report in compliance with the statutes.

Seven schools have been maintained the past year, varying in length from twenty-five to thirty-one weeks each. This variation, omitting the Centre school, was the result of adding to some of the schools the weeks they were entitled to have added to them, as stated in last year's school report. The Centre school was seriously interrupted, first, by the sickness of the teacher, Miss Phelps, who commenced the summer term, and afterwards by the sickness of pupils, and the terms were shorter than they otherwise would have been, and the coming year the school will be entitled to have 6.6 weeks added to it.

Pupils in all of our schools have made commendable progress in their studies, and teachers are deserving much praise for the painstaking interest they have manifested for the schools under their charge. Miss Ola I. Tripp completed the Elementary Algebra and Complete Arithmetic, and Master Charlie A. Brown finished the Complete Arithmetic in a very thorough manner. An Elementary Physiology, having special reference to the evil effects of narcotics and alcoholic drinks upon the human system, has been introduced into all of our schools the past year, and a work entitled, "The American Citizen," has been used for the first time in the Gossville and New Rye schools for a supplementary reading. The coming year we hope to see "The American Citizen" used in all of the schools. By these books scholars are taught that they are not at school merely to learn how to earn a liv-

ing, or to be able to read many books, but to become men and women, who shall help the state by their lives.

Irregularity of attendance is still a prominent evil in some of our schools. Increased effort should be made to prevent it. Parents should try to help the teachers of their schools by never allowing anything trivial to interfere with the constant attendance of their children at school, and try to arouse that pride in them which tends to punctuality.

The Centre and New Rye schoolhouses have been painted during the past year, and it is hoped that other schoolhouses will be repaired and painted in the near future. Somewhat extensive repairs should be made to the Gossville schoolhouse, or else (what would be better, perhaps) a new one should be built in its stead. We think a good schoolhouse is closely connected with a good school, and that a poor schoolhouse exerts an exceedingly bad influence upon the character of a school. As a rule, the schoolhouse should be as agreeable to the eye and attractive every way as the best house in the neighborhood. Then, with a good teacher, will it be to the young mind next to the parental home, "the dearest spot on earth."

The number of children in town between the ages of five and fifteen years by the selectmen's examination in April, 1893, is: boys, 45; girls, 44. This is a less number of children than the number that attended the Centre school some fifty years ago. The number of scholars in town is constantly diminishing, and some of the schools are very small. In view of this fact, we would suggest for the consideration of the district, the plan of uniting our schools for the winter term, limiting the number of schools to three or four. A good teacher can instruct twenty-five pupils just as well as he can instruct five, and a school of twenty-five pupils would be far more interesting to teacher and scholars than one having one fifth of this number.

Statistics show that the average number of days that the public schools in the state of New Hampshire were kept for the year 1891-92 is 121.6. The average number of days our

schools kept the past year is a fraction more than 141. Thus it will be seen that we are giving our pupils more schooling than other towns on an average in our state give their pupils. But we are not doing too much for our schools. Let us continue to be generous in our outlays for them. Franklin says "an investment in knowledge always pays the best interest." The sums expended annually for the support of schools have more than anything else made us what we are; they have returned to us as interest an amount of good which cannot be estimated or measured.

For length of schools, names and wages of teachers, number of scholars in each school, and average attendance, etc., you are referred to a tabular statement on another page.
