TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of chapter 87, section 1, of the Revised Statutes, on a section of the so-called Suncook Valley road, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$400.00 for this purpose.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for State Aid Maintenance, the state to give \$1,800.00.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance, the state to give \$5,250.00.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for construction of a section of the Suncook Valley road, so-called, the state to give \$7,500.00, and

to empower the Selectmen to borrow from the state, in accordance with the provisions of House Bill No. 310, such moneys as may be necessary to pay the Town's share of the expense incurred by continuing the project as far as possible during the year 1929, provided the Town is allowed to do the construction work on said project.

Note. The requirements of the state are that the Town shall raise the sum of \$20,500.00 to be expended with the sum of \$61,500.00 to be contributed by the state, prior to the expiration of 1930.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160.00 for the library as requested by the Trustees.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Old Home Day.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to help support a resident physician.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish four hydrants on the, so-called, Black Hall road.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of 500 feet of fire hose.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money sufficient to cover the cost of installation of electric lights in Library building.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$300.00 for the construction of a concrete abutment at Ritchie Bridge, so-called.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to cancel the tractor plow note.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in the care and improvement of Webster Park and appoint a commission to have charge of **same**.

18. To see if the Town will vote to subject to gates and bars the so-called, Tarleton road from the Mountain road to the Tarleton buildings, and discontinue balance of said road.

19. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on all property taxes paid in full before July first.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

21. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my ninth annual report of the schools of Epsom, for the year ending June 30, 1928.

There were maintained during the year, four schools, for a school-year of 36 weeks, with no change in the teaching force.

The total school enrollment was 104, (50 boys and 54 girls), with a daily average attendance of 92.98 per cent.

The schools were in session on an average of 346 half-days.

Length of School Year

The School Laws of New Hampshire, Chapter 117.

“The school board of every district shall provide standard elementary schools for at least thirty-six weeks in each year at such places in the district as will best serve the interests of education and give to all the pupils within the district as nearly equal advantages as are practicable.”

The school board has endeavored to so arrange the school calendar that this law may be carried out.

The assignment of the pupils to four schools increased the per cent of attendance and improved the work done by the pupils.

The great decrease in rural population presents to the school board a serious problem in determining the number of rural schools to maintain.

Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, speaking before the National Educational Association at Washington on Rural Education said, “The trek city ward is already under way. If it shall go on so rapidly as it has in the last five years, the next generation will witness a farm popu-

lation largely composed of the physically and mentally unfit.

"Educators have not been blind to this distressing contrast. In some sections of the country consolidated country schools have been established. These schools have marked a vast improvement in the life of the community, for farmers are as eager to give their children a good education as are those who live in the cities and the towns."

Health

The school nurse, Miss Douillette, has done faithful and efficient work both in the school and in the home.

The health of the child in a large measure determines his regularity of attendance, his behavior and his ability to do his work.

Efficient supervision and instruction in matters of health should have an important place in every school organization.

The success of these supervised school periods depends upon the initiative and the skill of the teacher.

The standardized tests given during the year in all the fundamentals showed an improvement in the work done in these branches during the year.

The school attendance was good. Most of the absences were caused by sickness.

The cases of truancy were confined to a few families who gave as a reason, their inability to provide proper clothing.

In conclusion I express my appreciation for the co-operation and assistance given to me by the teachers, school board and citizens.
