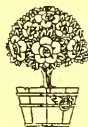

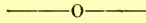

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Epsom, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.
4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty dollars for the observance of Old Home Day.
5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Four hundred dollars for the White Pine Blister Rust control.
6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Five hundred thirty-seven dollars for the construction of Class V. Roads, T.R.A., so-called; the State to con-

tribute Two thousand one hundred forty-seven dollars and ninety-eight cents.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase new Fire Equipment.

8. To see what discount, if any, the Town will allow on all property taxes paid previous to July 1, 1941.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

10. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE EPSOM PUBLIC LIBRARY

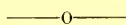

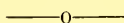

## REPORT OF EPSOM VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT



I herewith submit the annual report of the Epsom Volunteer Fire Department. Our records show that eighteen calls were made during the year. Our most serious fire was caused by lightning, and although men responded quickly, the fire gained such headway that it was necessary to call for assistance from three out-of-town departments.

Delegates were sent to the State Convention and we have held regular meetings each month. Our annual turkey banquet was held, with a good number of our members in attendance.

A winter carnival, held jointly with the Chichester Fire Department, added a substantial amount to our treasury.

Some new material has been purchased, but there is a need for more modern equipment.

The State Fire Warden, Harold S. Bickford, requests your continued co-operation in kindling and reporting out-of-door fires.

### To the Citizens of Epsom:

Our forest lands represent a substantial proportion of the town's valuation. They provide income to our citizens, from the sale of forest products and through employment to woods' workers. The protection of our forest land is essential to the continued welfare of the town. Fire is the forests' worst enemy. It not only destroys the growing crop but leaves the land in such condition that nothing of value will grow for a long period of years. In addition it costs good tax money to extinguish forest fires.

An analysis of forest fire records indicate that 97 per cent are man-caused and consequently avoidable. Carelessness and failure to comply with reasonable regulations governing the building of fires in and near woodlands has been costly to both towns and individuals. Through elimination of the human equation, forest fire losses would be reduced to a minimum. This is possible if every citizen would be careful, familiarize himself with burning regulations, comply with them and then use proper discretion.

We have been particularly fortunate in this town since the hurricane in not having had more serious fires. This is due in part to the strictness of our wardens in issuing permits and splendid cooperation on the part of the public. Great care is needed because conditions in our blown-down areas are more critical with down material drying out and becoming more highly inflammable. *The continued co-operation* of every one is necessary.

We should all remember that:

1. *Written permission of the local forest fire warden to burn brush, rubbish or other debris in or near woodlands or where fire may be communicated to woodlands is necessary when the ground is not covered with snow.* Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable—

- a. To a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.
  - b. To the town for expenses incurred by the warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.
  - c. For damages to abutting owners if the fire runs onto the abutters' property.
2. It is a violation of the Forest Laws of the state to—
    - a. Drop or throw any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire, from any vehicle while the same is upon a public highway or private way.
    - b. Drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.

Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty by a fine of \$25.00.

3. You should promptly notify your local forest fire warden of any fires you see.
4. The forest laws are being more strictly enforced each year.

Your cooperation will save the warden considerable worry; you and your town much trouble and expense.

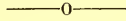

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS



To the School Board and Citizens of Epsom:

At the present time, schools are being maintained in Epsom as follows:

There are twenty-nine pupils attending Pembroke Academy, four in Concord High School, and one in Coe-Brown Academy. Five elementary pupils are being carried to Pittsfield, and one is going to Chichester.

Requirements for transportation vehicles have been still further raised, to conform to standards widely adopted throughout the United States. Epsom transporters have willingly complied with these standards at considerable expense, with resulting improvement in safety and convenience of children carried.

Educational honor was brought to Epsom when Cadet Harold C. Brown, resident and former pupil of the elementary schools, was graduated in June at the head of his class at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, having maintained "highest standing in general order of merit" for four years in a class of 450. Cadet Brown was given a public reception at the Epsom Town Hall on June 15.

In addition to making the annual individual health examination and the usual routine visits, the School nurse,

Miss Adonia Douillette, has frequently been called for consultation in regard to epidemics or other health conditions. The nurse also arranged for treatment of pupils at six types of medical clinics, especially the dental clinic held in Epsom with the cooperation of the Epsom Red Cross, at which forty-four children received dental certificates from Dr. N. C. Mayo.

In the recent death of Mrs. Sophronia Y. Wells, Epsom lost a faithful friend of the schools. Mrs. Wells at one time was a teacher of music in this and surrounding towns. She has served on the School Board, and held the office of district auditor for the current year.

The schools are essential to the defense of the nation. In them the rising generation learns the meaning and history of that democracy which it is the instinct of every true American to defend. Intelligent citizens need no dictator. The knowledge of truth prepares for Freedom, and wise discipline prepares for just government preserving the rights of all.
