

Lewis Harvey Nutter died suddenly January 3, 1948. He was born in Pittsfield July 6, 1884, the son of Matthew H. and Minerva Merrill Nutter. He attended Pittsfield High and Mt. Hermon schools and was graduated from Brown University with the degree of B.A. in 1908. He taught classical subjects in New Hampshire and Connecticut schools for several years, returning to Pittsfield to assist his father in the hardware business.

He married Eleanora Chesley August 24, 1918, and came to Epsom to live. He is survived by his wife and two children, Mary F. and Edward H. Nutter.

Mr. Nutter took an active part in the civic and fraternal affairs of the town, serving as Noble Grand of Evergreen Lodge, I.O.O.F., and was Vice Grand at the time of his death. He was affiliated with Jephtha Lodge, No. 95, A.F. and A.M., of Clinton, Conn. He served seven years as Moderator of the School District and six years as Member of the School Board, seventeen years as Town Auditor, ten years on the Budget Committee, was Representative to the General Court in 1937-38, and Delegate to the Constitutional Convention in 1938. He was serving as Selectman at the time of his death.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon until six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To choose a delegate to the Constitutional Convention as provided in Chapter 77, Laws of 1947.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$281.10 to cover a deficit in the previous year's accounts as shown in the Financial Report for the year ending December 31, 1947.
- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$616.38 for the maintenance, construction or re-construction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$2,465.52, as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of paying part of the Town's share of the cost of a State-Aid Bridge to be constructed over

the Suncook River on the Short Falls Road, or act in any way relating thereto.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not exceeding \$6,000.00 in addition to the amount authorized to be borrowed at the annual Town meeting in March 1946, to meet the Town's share of the cost of a State-Aid Bridge to be constructed over the Suncook River on the Short Falls Road, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to repair the Caterpillar Tractor & Snow Plow or dispose of it by private sale or public auction, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 and authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not exceeding \$6,000.00 for the purchase of new snow removal and highway equipment or act in any way relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for new hydrant service and the construction of water holes for fire protection in accordance with a report by a special committee appointed by the Fire Department, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to amend the vote under Section B, Article 8 of the 1947 Warrant to read, "The road northerly from the barn of property of Mabelle T. Bartlett towards Pittsfield Town Line."

- 13. To see what discount, if any, the Town will allow on all property taxes paid previous to July 1, 1948, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of taking the annual inventory.

REPORT OF THOMAS J. KING, DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF

Forest Fire Problem Serious

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control

agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 per cent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

The program of legislation anticipated a year ago has been enacted and is in operation. Epsom will receive this year in state aid the sum of \$5,866.38, or an increase of \$5,057.88 over last year. Besides the new equalization act, which increased state aid in New Hampshire by about 400%, the following laws have been passed by the General Court:

To permit the establishment of cooperative school districts.

Increasing the school district debt limit from 2% of the valuation to 5%, or 8% in special cases.

Enabling the district to accumulate a capital reserve fund for improvements.

Improving the teachers' retirement act and admitting school nurses and teachers in approved public academies.

An irksome provision requiring repayment of tuition to the teachers' colleges for graduates not teaching in the state a specified length of time was repealed. Provision is made for scholarships to be granted by the State Board of Education to high school graduates desiring to become teachers and otherwise unable to attend.

Providing for examination and treatment of problem children temporarily in a receiving home.

Establishing a Director of Nursing Education.

Fostering vocational education through a program of apprenticeship in industry.

This legislation is set forth in full in Institute Circular No. 174 entitled "Education Legislation of 1947" (State Board of Education, Concord, N. H.)

Further regulations have been made by the State Board of Education as follows:

Minimum Standards for Teachers' Salaries

- 1. Less than 4 years of college preparation and less than 5 years of experience, \$1,700.
- 2. Regularly certified, with less than 4 years of college preparation, but with 5 years of experience, \$1,800.
- 3. Regularly certified, with 4 years college preparation, but less than 3 years of experience, \$1,800.
- 4. Regularly certified, with 4 years of college preparation and 3 years of experience, \$2,000.

The effect of the above regulation is already beginning to be felt in the supply of available teachers and candidates for teacher-training.

The regulations governing the approval of superintendents, headmasters, principals, teachers, and other educational personnel in the public schools of New Hampshire have been revised, with the establishment of an advisory board on problems of certification. Certificates hereafter will be for a period of 7 years, instead of for life, and will depend for their renewal on the completion of six semester hours of professional study (the equivalent of 3 extension courses or one full summer school).

Another state regulation provides that schools shall hereafter actually be in session 180 days per year (less 5 days of an intensive professional "workshop," if offered locally). Such weeklong institutes would give opportunity for teachers to satisfy the credit requirements of the foregoing paragraph. The additional requirements in regard to certification and school year should be borne in mind in connection with the minimum salary regulation.

The legislature provided for special district meetings in the summer to make revised appropriations necessitated by the new laws and regulations.

Dr. Gertrude M. Lewis, recently appointed state supervisor of elementary education, has visited the grade schools in the district and conferred with the teachers.
