

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$633.12 for the maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$4,220.77 as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945 and Chapter 18, Laws of 1949.
- 5. To see what discount, if any, the Town will allow on all property taxes paid within fourteen days of presentation of warrant to Collector, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
  - 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of taking the annual inventory.

- 8. To see if the Town will accept the properties of the Short Falls Cemetery Association, Inc. Trust Funds to be used as stipulated in the will of the donor. Take any other action pertaining to the same. (By Petition)
- 9. To see what action the Town will take in regards to disposing of the timbers removed from the Short Falls Bridge.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as open highways and make subject to gates and bars, the following:
  - A. Nigger Hill Road, so called, from its junctions with the State Route 107 southerly to its junction with Center Hill Road.
  - B. Tarleton Road, so called.
  - C. Turnpike between J. P. Yeaton's and the Foster Place.
  - D. Range Road, from Arthur Locke's to David Bartons.
  - E. Road leading from Frank Hatch's house northerly to Granny Howe Road.
  - F. Chesley Road from Eleanora Nutters to Center Hill Road.
  - G. Mountain Road from Anson Cass Road to Tripps Corner.
  - H. Mountain Road from Mountain School House to Allenstown line.
  - I. Poor Town Road from Fowler School House to the Pembroke line.

as provided in Section 2, Part 9, Chapter 188, laws of 1945.

- 11. Pursuant to the provisions of the laws as revised Chapter 292, Section 7, 1949. The following article is submitted: Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?
- 12. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF EPSOM PUBLIC LIBRARY

We are glad to report that 800 more books were drawn from the Library by our readers in 1950 than in 1949. One new reader asked "How much does it cost me to take a book to read?" Perhaps we should call ourselves "The Epsom FREE Public Library" so that all will know that our Town Library is without cost to all who will use it.

The painting of the building has been completed. The wind damage to the roof has been repaired at the expense of the insurance company.

The Library now has the Epsom Town Reports in bound volumes for the years 1882 to 1949.

With appropriate ceremonies on Memorial Day, the Epsom Women's Club set out on the Library lawn, three white birch trees to the memory of the Epsom boys who gave their lives in the military service of our Country.

The Trustees have been consulting with our school teachers about plans to make the Library facilities more readily available to their pupils. We hope to have branch libraries in the school buildings in the near future; thus, books will be available five days each week of the school year. At present the Library is open only on Saturday afternoons.

We have in mind to place in the Library a locked filing cabinet where those who wish to do so, may place for reference such documents or pictures as pertain to the history of Epsom. In Winter, our Library is inadequately heated. In cold weather, neither the book-shelves room nor the reading room can be made comfortable. It is a difficult problem which no doubt can be solved if the cost is not prohibitive.

In 1952 we are entitled to a half-century celebration, for our present Library Building was dedicated and opened for service on August 21, 1902.

#### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

#### Forest Fire Prevention Pays Dividends

Most forest fires are preventable because someone is responsible for them. State records for 1950 show 94% of 632 fires resulted from human perverseness and carelessness. Refusal to secure the required warden permit before burning; failure to use good judgment, lack of equipment and assistance while burning; carelessness in smoking and poorly conditioned woods equipment (trucks, tractors, etc.) resulted in a total of 6,090.6 burned acres with a loss of \$63,949.10 in valuable property.

Fortunately, these human factors can be dealt with because people can be reached. This the local forest the local forest fire warden tries to do by informing his fellow citizens that EVERYONE MUST:—

- 1. Secure a written permit to burn in or near woodlands when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 2. Use good judgment in burning and have enough equipment and assistance to keep fire under control at all times.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands and refrain from throwing lighted material from automobiles.
- 4. Make certain that all equipment used in the woods is in good condition.

His success depends entirely upon public reaction to his appeals. He does his part—the rest depends upon YOU and

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Epsom qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March 1951, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, fo rthe salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for new equipment.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be deposited with the town trustees of trust funds as additional capital reserve, to be set aside with past years appropriations until needed toward the construction of a Central School Building in the Town of Epsom, N. H., as voted at the School Meeting in 1947. (By petition).
- 11. To see whether the School District will authorize the School Board to sell the New Rye School House to the New Rye Union Congregational Church for a nominal sum of money, the amount to be agreed upon with the Church; it being understood that the Church desires the school building for its Sunday School services and other activities of the Church.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
