RALPH E. TOWLE

Born in Epsom April 5, 1875, a graduate of Grinnell College, Superintendent of Schools at Algona, Iowa, Vice-President of American Express Company and founder of its Travel Service, a veteran of the Spanish-American War, member of the Presbyterian Church, a Mason and International Skat Club member.

Mr. Towle retired to his farm in Epsom in 1940 where he was active in civic affairs. He served two terms in the Legislature; served on the School and Library Boards; was Chairman of the Red Cross and Secretary of the Fire Department. He died at his home, December 6, 1958.



RALPH TREMAINE OSBORN

Born Oct. 19, 1906 in Alexandria, Minn. Died July 21, 1958 in San Francisco, California. Educated: Syracuse University (A.B.), Gordon College of Theology and Missions (Th.B.).

Served as pastor of Epsom Baptist Church from Dec. 1931 through Dec. 1938. Charter and life member of Epsom Fire Dept.

Moved to Baptist Church in Camillus, N. Y. in 1939 where he served until he was commissioned an Army Chaplain in 1941.

Except for short pastorate at Trinity Baptist Church in Brooklyn, N. Y., his service as chaplain was uninterrupted until his death.

At the time of death Chaplain (Lt. Col) Osborn was assigned to Fort Baker, Calif., Headquarters of the Army Air Defense Command.

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at one of the clock in the afternoon until eight of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$761.46 for the maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$5,076.06 as provided in Chapter 83, Laws of 1953.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of taking the Annual Inventory.

6. Pursuant to the Provisions of the Laws as revised, Chapter 292, Section 7, 1949. The following Article is submitted: Shall the Provision of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to purchase advertising space in the 1960 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or act in relation thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Funds, the interest only to be used for care of cemetery lots as specified:

McCLARY CEMETERY

\$150.00 Joseph A. Warren, given by H. Leslie Warren

\$300.00 Frederick and Henry F. Sanborn, given by Grace Hartin, Marion Van Sant and Bruce W. Sanborn

HOPKINSON CEMETERY

\$100.00 Rufus Doe and Charles Palmer, given by Augustus Palmer

SHORT FALLS CEMETERY

\$300.00 Tripp and Prescott, given by Mrs. Hattie Heath

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars the Tarleton Road so called.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to investigate the erecting of road name signs and report findings at the next annual meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$444.00 for the Concord Hospital to help offset the estimated operating deficit for the year 1959.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Tax Collector from \$350.00 to \$400.00. (Recommended in the Budget).

13. To see if the Town will vote to spend no more than \$100.00 in 1959 to improve the road at the Northwood Lake Development located in Epsom, funds for the project to be taken from highway appropriations.

14. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to disposing of the Town Truck.

15. (a) To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

(b) To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

(c) To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

(d) If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

16. If Article 15 is adopted, to see if the Town will raise the salary of the Treasurer \$100.00 to compensate for the extra work involved.

17. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before this meeting.

REPORT OF EPSOM VOLUNTEER
FIRE DEPARTMENT

For Year Ending December 31, 1958

Following is submitted the annual report of the Epsom Volunteer Fire Department.

We were very lucky in keeping our 1958 fire loss very small with a total of fourteen fires. The only great loss was one house fire with a loss of \$1,000.00. The greatest cost being in several brush fires.

We are doing all we can to increase the efficiency of the Department and its equipment, but we are in need of more funds to keep up with the added property we are expected to protect.

As in last year's report rather than repeat previous reports, I will ask you to read the *Fire Report* in your Town Reports for the past several years. (1956 in particular) You will learn fire dangers, how you can keep fire loss down, how to call the Fire Department, and how the Fire Department can help you in your safety problems.

Our motto is — THINK. *This is your Department* and is as efficient as you make it.

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you — personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty.

Use your town dump.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Epsom qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Epsom Central School in said district on the 7th day of March 1959, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapters 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The cost of education continues to increase proportionately to the increases in other areas of our economy.

The above increase in High School Tuition rates and the increased enrollment of pupils attending high school has a dollar impact in your 1959-60 school budget. These are statutory obligations which must be met by the school district. Another factor is the continued shortage of qualified teachers, making it necessary to increase teachers' salaries in order to keep them. It is fundamentally essential that we retain our good teachers so that your children may have the benefit of the best education available. Unless salaries are increased we are in a vulnerable position from the surrounding cities and towns.

Many improvements have been made at the school this year, both in the physical plant and in the general area of curriculum. Briefly, important improvements in the physical plant should include the addition of a new piece of playground equipment, a jungle gym. This was purchased for the school jointly, by the School Board and the P.T.A. It has been tremendously popular with the young children and has helped to alleviate the problem of insufficient playground equipment for this group.

Through the purchase of new social studies textbooks for four grades, we completed the Tiegs-Adams social studies series throughout the school. Such a series provides more organization and correlation in any subject area and thus results in most efficient and profound learning. Similarly, with the acquisition of new reading books for the second and third grades, we have established the highly regarded McKee Reading Series in the school. Other instructional aids which have been acquired include new maps, word study charts and filmstrips, the latter being purchased with money made by the children themselves during the highly successful magazine drive carried on in the fall.

For the past several years it has been the practice at the school to have a half-hour afternoon recess. There

had been some criticism of this practice, so, early in the year this problem was considered. The teachers felt that a break in the afternoon classroom routine was essential for most of the children, therefore, the following valuable skills and experiences were developed, things which in their own way, perhaps, are as valuable as regular classroom achievement; home economics for the girls, where the basic fundamentals of domestic science are developed; art, where those students who have a feeling or talent in this direction, have an opportunity to learn many of the fundamentals that are essential to successful accomplishment in this field; music, where those interested in music dig a little deeper into the subject than is done in the regular music period; dramatics, where students with a flair in this field have a chance to develop their talents (this area also has beneficial side effects — children develop a confidence in their ability to express themselves well and to face large groups effectively, and have to learn how to accept a great deal of responsibility in the production of a play); electronics, where boys with a proficiency in science have a chance to develop their interests and understandings in this field which grows more and more important to the modern world every year; the school paper; here pupils gain an insight into one of the vital fields of modern democratic life, the field of communication, especially as it pertains to the press. Not only are their powers of observation and discrimination developed but qualities such as cooperation, tact, responsibility and initiative grow. Therefore, we feel that the Activity Period is a tremendously valuable addition to the school curriculum. It coincides with the strictly academic interests of the school in some cases and goes beyond them in others, providing in addition, social skills and a broadening of the pupils outlook on life and, therefore, his chances of success and happiness in life.

I am sure that the community joins me in paying respect to Miss Myrtle Fletcher, R.N., deceased last summer, who, for so many years served faithfully and well, this community.

In conclusion, may I express my appreciation to Principal David Roberts and his staff of teachers for their deep interest, and performance beyond the call of duty, to the cooperation of the Epsom School Board and the citizens of Epsom in providing the type of educational program which is now enjoyed by the Epsom children.
