The Polls will be open from 10:00 A. M. and will not close until after the Business Meeting. (Business Meeting 7:30)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the fifth day of March, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
 - 2. To elect delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
- 3. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.48 for the maintenance, construction, or reconstruction of Class V Highways; the State to contribute \$6,003.21 as provided in Chapter 83 Laws of 1953.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$572.00 for the Concord Hospital to help offset the estimated deficit of the year 1973. (Recommended in the Budget)

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the Barnstead Ambulance Fund. (Recommended in the Budget)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund in anticipation of improvements to Knowles' Bridge. (Recommended in the Budget)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be put into the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of a Town Dump (Sanitary Land-Fill Project, or an incinerator) (Recommended in the Budget)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Funds, the interest only, to be used for the case of family lots in Epsom Cemeteries:

11. To appropriate a sum of money for the Town's share of the operation of the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,016.00 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These

funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. (Included in the Budget)

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Town Clerk's salary from \$75.00 to \$175.00. (Recommended in the Budget)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote that the Highway and/ or Road Agent for the Town of Epsom, N. H. shall no longer be an appointed official but shall be an official elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting of said Town; Pursuant to N.H.R.S.A. 245:6; the first said election to be held at the Annual Meeting of 1975 and all other subsequent Annual Town Meetings. (By Petition)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be put into a Capital Reserve Fund for compiling a Town Tax Map as required by State Law by 1980. (Recommended in the Budget)

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept grants of Federal or State Aid or both as may be available and to expend such grants for reconstruction of Town roads, bridges or portions thereof destroyed by flooding and to do all things necessary to carry out the purposes of this Article.
- 17. To see what action the Town will take on the following Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance as presented by the Planning Board:

Article III, Section B.

Add: Any pre-existing lot, not located in a subdivision, which does not abut land of the same ownership shall be considered of conforming size provided such lot shall meet all dimensional and area requirements, if any, in existence at the time the lot was created. Any lot located in a subdivision approved by the Epsom Planning Board, subsequent to March 6, 1973, which does not abut land of the same ownership shall be considered of conforming size provided such lot shall meet all dimensional and area requirements in existence at the time the lot was created.

Article III, Section G.

Amend second paragraph to read: The Board of Adjustment shall be empowered to grant a variance to the frontage requirement where the lot for which the variance is sought does not abut land of the same ownership and where all other requirements for variance have been met or where a lot is accessible by means of a private right of way; provided such a lot meets all other zoning requirements and the private right of way does not create an illegal lot size in the lot from which it is taken.

18. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

LIBRARIAN REPORT

Many activities have taken place during the year toward better serving you, the public, in the future. The library now has a basement that will be used as the reference room and home for all the reference books. town histories and genealogies. This room will also be used for story hours, reading programs and film programs. The former reference room upstairs is being used for the childrens room — with small reading table and their books displayed at better advantage. Arrangements have been made for the ceiling to be installed downstairs. and the lighting system installed in the near future. The volunteers will then seal the walls. The Epsom Garden Club has donated their services for doing some of the landscaping on the library grounds in the spring. Water was brought to the building and a toilet and lavatory was installed

New hours have been used this year. During the summer months the library was open from 1 to 5 P.M. and 7 to 9 P.M. on Wednesdays and on Saturdays from 10 A.M. to 5 P.M. Because of the present energy crisis, the library has cut the hours and is not open on Wednesday from 2 to 6 P.M. This seems to be working as well as the longer hours and still gives the working people time to stop on their way home from work. The hours remain the same on Saturdays.

During the past year the librarian has been ably assisted by Mrs. Orrin Merrill on Wednesdays and Mrs. Gertrude Stevens on Saturdays. Mrs. Elsie Fife has helped when needed. They have also helped with availing the library facilities to the school children, teachers, nursing homes and interested groups.

Story hours were held every other week during the

summer with Misses Katrina Fowler and Jane Bassett and Mrs. Elsie Fife as readers. A thank you to all.

The Epsom Historical Society has purchased the book "State of New Hampshire" in memory of Mrs. Madeline Yeaton. The Epsom Women Club has donated the book "Maria" by Maria Trapp in memory of Mrs. Edna Clarke.

Mrs. Ellen Eppelsheimer is still taking books to the shut ins in the community. If you would like this service or know of anyone that is homebound, please contact the librarian for arrangements.

A complete set of the Americana encyclopedia has been given to the library by Mr. & Mrs. Martel of Suncook. This will greatly add to the present reference books.

The library trustees agreed at a recent meeting that the rules and regulations had been loosened too much and we had all become too lax in returning library properties. All books, records or magazines overdue will be noted and the borrower will be fined two cents a day for any overdues. Until such fine is paid, all borrowing privileges will be revoked until such time as the borrower is in again in good standing. NO films are to be left at the library — they must be returned to the librarian or to the State Library directly with completed form that is enclosed with each film. All state library books must be returned to the librarian before the due date so they will be in the State Library on the due date — we are very lax in this respect. If you wish renewed please contact the librarian for an extension. Books, magazines. and records are on a three week loan basis and there is no renewal period.

The Epsom Central School students have enjoyed various visits to the library with their teachers during the past year. The teachers have borrowed collections for classroom reading.

It is hoped that you as Epsom citizens will come into the library and enjoy the material available for your enjoyment. We are there to aid you in your requests and have enjoyed working with you during the past year.

This is your library, if you have any suggestions to better the library services, please feel free to let us hear of them.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

REFUSE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE - 1974

The Refuse Disposal Planning Committee representatives appointed by the Town Moderator in 1972 joined with eleven other communities to form the Capital Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board. The Board action in May was taken under N. H. RSA 53-B:3. The cooperating communities are Allenstown, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Dunbarton, Epsom, Henniker, Hopkinton, Loudon, Pembroke, Salisbury, and Warner.

In June the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission received a \$40,000 Federal grant to plan a refuse disposal system to meet the needs of the cooperating communities according to New Hampshire law. The Refuse Planning Board works with the Regional Commission as the refuse planning operation. The 30 cents per capita solid waste assessment in 1973 was a condition of the Federal contract for all communities in the Disposal Planning Board. These funds are held in escrow to be used to further the disposal planning program with acquisition and site work as necessary. No further solid waste assessment is requested in 1974.

To date, seven sites have been investigated under the engineering contract with the Anderson-Nichols Company to determine the capability of the sites to accept solid waste in landfill operations as required. In 1974, under the 24-month contract, the detailed engineering, operations requirements, costs, financial and legal data will be developed to be presented to member communities for final action in 1975.

EPSOM PLANNING BOARD

Annual Report

1973 was a hectic year with numerous battles. While the Board greatly appreciates the votes of those who supported the Board's efforts to keep Epsom a rural town we also wish the fences could be mended.

In 1973 a number of minor subdivisions were passed by the Board, nearly all of large acreage. The Board also approved three major subdivisions. Mr. Heath had his continuing development at Northwood Lake approved on the grounds that extensive funds had been spent on the lots previous to subdivision regulations. Mr. Thompson received approval for eight lots on the west side of Goboro Road after he consented to acquire the railroad right of way. The lots averaged nearly three acres in size. Land Auction of Boston was given approval for a 26 lot development on 257 acres at Chestnut Pond, one lot being 86 acres, making the average lots five or more acres. While we have had almost no difficulties with minor subdivisions, we have made mistakes and hopefully learned enough to not make the same mistakes again.

Our major problem is that the average homeowner of Epsom is not present at the public hearings on the major subdivisions. Like Washington, however, the special interest groups are represented. We post these hearings as best we can and will try to secure better newspaper coverage in the hopes people will attend and voice their opinions. Don't give your rights away by not attending — we want to represent you, but you must tell us what you want.

The students in the upper levels at Epsom Central have an opportunity to participate in various team sports, soccer, girls and boys basketball and girls softball and boys hasehall

We will have the outdoor basketball court finished this coming summer. The major problem has been the landscaping which has to be redone. No major work has been done on the school grounds since the school has been

built. We have had the grounds surveyed and are working towards a program that will give the students a better all-around playground area.

In the academic field we have put into the school a new social studies program which we believe is relevant to our present times and relates important ideas and facts about our past history and democratic way of life.

We have continued the learning disabilities program. This is a Federally Funded program that we are sharing this year with Supervisory Union No. 53.

We are initiating a curriculum study program in Science for Levels 1 through eighth grade. The program will be co-ordinated with the program at Pembroke Academy. This program will be inquiry oriented with strong emphasis on lab orientation at the seventh and eighth grade level.

We also hope to establish new courses in consumer and career education at the seventh and eighth grade levels to meet the students demanding needs and interests.

I would like to thank the School Board and townspeople for their support of the school's programs.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Epsom, New Hampshire 1972 - 1973

To the Superintendent:

The health program for the year 1972-1973 was carried out in the usual manner with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. When defects were noted, the appropriate referral and follow-up were made.

The students received the benefit of preventative dental care through classroom visits by a hygienist sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health. One-hundred and forty-six students participated in the cleaning and fluoride clinic held during the fall months at school. The students in grades seven and eight were offered the opportunity to attend the N. H. Technical Institute Dental Clinic for cleaning and fluoride treatment. Sixty students participated in this clinic.

Due to a measles epidemic, an immunization clinic was held early in September. A total of one-hundred and nine doses of Regular Measles vaccine were administered by Dr. Harold Conrad, Pittsfield. The Heaf Test was offered to all school personnel in March. A total of sixteen tests were administered. In May, twenty-four students were registered for school entry at a pre-school clinic. First Aid was offered to approximately ninety-seven students, six home visits were made and eight ill students were transported home. One student was transported to the dentist and one to the hospital.

The school nurse participated in the following activities during the school year; attended informative workshops on vision and hearing; taught a Red Cross First Aid Course to the faculty at Barrington Elementary School; attended a Cardiac-Pulmonary Resuscitation Clinic at Concord hospital; assisted at the Well Child Clinics in

Deerfield; planned a P.T.O. program on Venereal Disease and assisted with the book-fair and chorus.

The teachers viewed a film on detecting health problems in school age children. The following films were shown to the students in conjunction with the health education program for the year; smoking, drug abuse, nutrition, personal health, dental health.

I would like to express my thanks to the Superintendent, School Board Members, teachers and parents for their cooperation and support during the past year.


