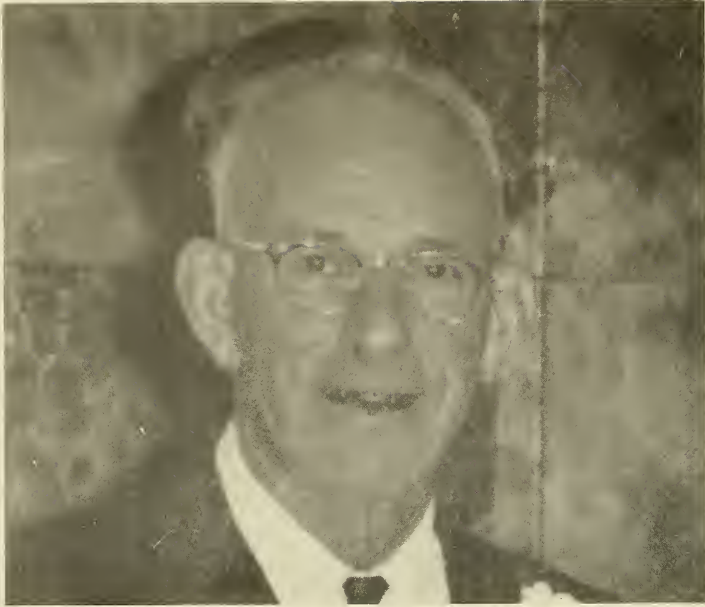

### **CHARLES N. HUCKINS**

Charles N. Huckins was born in Deerfield on March 22, 1897, the son of Mary and Edmund Huckins.

He attended Deerfield grammar schools and came to Epsom at an early age and had been a businessman in Epsom over 55 years.

He was the founder of Huckins Chevrolet Inc. and was founder and president of Huckins Oil Co.

In the past, he had served as director of the Suncook Valley R. R. and was active in the federal rationing board during World War II.

He was former director and was an honorary director of Suncook Bank.

He was a charter member of the Epsom Fire Dept. and a member of the Corinthian Lodge, F. & A. M. and Pleiades Chapter O.E.S., both of Pittsfield, a former member of N. H. Auto Dealers Association and a member of the N. H. Petroleum and Oil Dealers Association.

In 1967, he was awarded the Epsom Citizen of the Year and in 1972, was honored as the Oil Man of the Year by the N. H. Petroleum Council.

When asked about any business success he may have had, Charlie always said, "I was born at just the right time."


He died on July 28, 1974, as the result of a tragic fire the day before at his Huckins Oil Co. plant.

Russell S. Yeaton, a lifetime resident of Epsom, N. H. was born June 3, 1893. He devoted his life in soil stewardship operating a dairy farm. He found further fulfillment in service to his community and his fellow man.

**The State of New Hampshire**

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The Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. and will not close until after the Business Meeting. (Business Meeting 7:30 P.M.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$896.74 for the maintenance, construction, or reconstruction of Class V. Highways; the State to contribute \$5,978.30 as provided in Chapter 83 Laws of 1953.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$713.00 for the Concord Hospital to help offset the estimated deficit of the year 1973. (Recommended in the Budget)
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the Barnstead Ambulance Fund. (Recommended in the Budget)

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund in anticipation of improvements to Knowles' Bridge. (Recommended in the Budget)

8. To appropriate a sum of money for the Town's share of the operation of the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,042.00 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes. (Included in the Budget)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.00 to be used in the White Pine Blister Rust Program. (Recommended in the Budget)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$280.00 for the Epsom Conservation Commission to cover anticipated expenses. (Recommended in the Budget.)

11. To see if the Town will vote to re-open a portion of the Range Road from New Orchard Road to the land of Bruce Barton. (Approximately one third of a mile)

12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discontinuing the road from the residence of George Wiggin (formerly Bickford & Huckins Sawmill) in a West-erly direction to Windemere Drive.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept a parcel of land donated by Mr. Roland S. Hall to be used as an addition to the McClary Cemetery.

14. To see if the Town will vote to join the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association for the purpose of providing nursing and therapeutic services at home, and other health programs through clinics to all residents of the town of Epsom, and to raise and appropriate not more than \$2,412.50. (\$1.25 per capita, population of 1,930) there for. (Not recommended in the Budget)

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Funds, or interest therefrom, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$742.80 for the continuation of services to the low-income residents of Epsom through the Suncook Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. By Petition. (Not recommended in the Budget)

17. To see if the Town will vote to require the approval of the Epsom Conservation Commission before any town land is sold, including land conveyed to the Town for unpaid taxes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Epsom Conservation Commission to hold, for Conservation Commission purpose, any land owned by the Town and



not required by the Selectmen for other purposes. This shall include land conveyed to the Town for unpaid taxes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used in preparation of the observance of the Bicentennial. (Recommended in the Budget)

20. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

## PLANNING BOARD REPORT

1974 proved to be a quiet and peaceful one compared to that of the previous year. The board, as you know, is made up of six appointed members and one selectman. All the meetings were well attended by the members.

Hans Wendler relinquished the chairmanship at the May meeting and the Board ultimately voted to have Richard Todd fill the vacant position. George Carlson was appointed by the Selectmen to fill the unexpired term of Richard Fowler who resigned for personal reasons and Alfred Bickford was reappointed for another term.

All subdivisions (major or minor) are open to everyone at the Public Hearings whether they are abutters or not. Approval or disapproval of a Final Plat is made by the majority of Board Members (present or not) and not by the Chairman or any one Board Member acting alone.

During the year, thirteen Minor Subdivisions were approved by the Board. They are as follows:

- 9 Subdivisions into 2 lots of two acres or more
- 1 Subdivision into 4 lots of five acres or more
- 3 Subdivisions to increase existing lot size
- One major subdivision not yet settled.

A special Planning Board meeting was held on November 27, at the Boards regular meeting time to discuss a Tax Map time table. Mr. Charles Clifford, Director of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission was present to explain what assistance was available to our town by Regional Planning. One such service is to fly the region for the purpose of obtaining aerial photographs suitable for tax mapping. Other special meetings are planned for the future.

## EPSOM CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

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The Epsom Conservation Commission has been holding regular monthly meetings since early in the spring of 1974. Among subjects discussed were the following:

- (1) The possible acquisition by the Town of certain scenic or recreation areas, two of which have been discussed. It is the committee's understanding that such a move would necessitate a town meeting vote to reverse an item concerning town ownership of lands.
- (2) The possibility of the Town appointing a resident tree warden whose duties might involve a small area of seedling trees as a potential source for town use suitable for replanting.
- (3) Updating enlargements of the town map to plan areas which might logically enable the commission to initiate area programs along conservation lines.
- (4) The surveillance of commercial abuses including lumbering operations clearance and sand and gravel pit operations adjacent to public roads.
- (5) The requesting of certain funds for the use of the commission in the pursuit of the above programs.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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While I have been associated with the Epsom School District for several years, this is my first report as Superintendent of Schools.

The latter part of the Spring term was given over to the usual activities involved with the closing of another school year. It was also a period in which we were quite busy with the organization staffing and the relocation of the new supervisory union office. Mrs. Sylvianne Martel, who has worked with me for the last several years as my secretary has remained in that capacity and proved to be of invaluable assistance in making the transition. The new bookkeeper and payroll clerk are Mrs. Claire Butler and Miss Louise Fanny respectively, Mr. Edmond Duchesne is the new Business Administrator. The office was moved from 100 Granite Street in Hooksett to Pembroke Street in Pembroke during the last week of June.

As soon as the office was relocated the task of restaffing the schools began in earnest. This was quite a formidable task this time as we hired several new teachers in Epsom and over forty in the five school districts that comprise Supervisory Union #53. As the personnel are the heart of any organization, we spent a great deal of time interviewing applicants in order that we might hire the best people.

Since the beginning of school, we have been occupied with normal activities that are with us during every school year. We have continued to refine the accounting systems and the budget preparation system in order that we might have more data to better account for the expenditures and efficient use of tax monies.

There are many areas wherein we need to improve our performance such as communication, curriculum revision, special services, student personnel services, etc. The longer that we are able to work together as a unit, the better will be our chances for success in the above-mentioned areas.

It is essential that we not lose sight of our basic duty to teach the essential skills of Reading, Writing and Arithmetic.

We must teach these skills in relation to the complex society that children will be entering; and must update the curriculum and teaching methods to keep pace with the ever changing requirements of children if they are to live and compete in our fluid society.

We must help children to become more independent learners. We must be more concerned with helping them to learn the thought process in order that they might be better equipped to solve occupational and personnel problems. Children today are going to be faced with a society that will change even more rapidly than the one that we are presently living in if that is possible to even imagine. If they are going to be able to cope with this type of rapid change they must be independent and secure. The idea that the teaching of the thought process is one of the basic responsibilities of education is not an idea that has been brought to us by the progressive educational movement rather it is an idea as old as the Classical Greek and Roman Educators.

It is most essential that we not lose sight that we must help the individual child to learn. All too often it is too easy to work with children in groups, thereby, losing sight of the needs of the individual. This is not only a problem in Education. It is a problem in American society. We constantly talk about the rights and needs of

the individual, and yet we seem to be constantly moving toward a society that is extremely impersonal, and the individual is lost in the masses.

In closing, I would like to thank the School Board, the School Staff and the citizens of the community for all that they have done for the Epsom children.

During the past year we have implemented the new science program. The ISCS program is lab orientated, and allows each student to learn scientific skills and principles in a laboratory setting.

We have finally completed the playground area. The grounds were graded to allow less soil erosion. The lower portion of the playground was graded to provide a better area for soccer and baseball.

The basketball court was paved and coated with a surface to provide a better playing surface.

A review of our present math curriculum was initiated during the 1973-1974 school year. We are presently reviewing new math programs and will adopt a program for the 1975-1976 school year.

The learning disabilities program will be continued. This program is a federally funded program that we share with Union #53.

Students at Epsom Central are able to participate in various organized sports activities. During the school year they engage in baseball, soccer, and basketball. Physical education activities are important to young people.

These activities along with competitive sports helps to develop coordination, strength and character. Together with a strong academic program I believe we work towards helping to develop the total child.

I would like to extend my thanks to the Epsom School Board for the support offered to me and the students of Epsom.
