TOWN MEETING MINUTES

March 18, 1989, opened at 9:35 A.M. by the Moderator, Paul Martell.

Paul turned the meeting over to Jack Kelleher who introduced Robert Yeaton who read the following motion:

That we the citizens of the Town of Epsom instruct the Selectmen to graciously accept the gift of approximately 1.5 acres of land adjacent to the Epsom Town Hall from Hazel P. Steele with the following covenants, conditions and restrictions which shall run with the land.

1. The premises shall be used for municipal purposes only, including, but not limited to, the expansion of municipal office space, library space and/or educational

or schooling space.

2. The premises shall not be re-sold, leased or transferred for profit, but shall remain municipal property, be used for municipal purposes only and shall revert to the grantor or her heirs upon breach of this condition.

3. The premises shall not be used for the storage of any municipal highway maintenance equipment and/or supplies.

4. The premises shall not be used for the storage,

disposal or transfer of any municipal waste materials.

That we further authorize the Selectmen and Trustees of the Epsom Public Library to appoint committees pertaining thereto.

This was seconded by Jack Kelleher on behalf of the entire board of selectmen. It was unanimously accepted by

a standing ovation.

Article 3: To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee. Jack Kelleher made a motion to accept the article as read and to pass over it until after article 13. Gloria Reeves seconded the motion. It passed in the affirmative.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five thousand (\$75,000) dollars for the purpose of reconstructing all of North Pembroke Road within the Town of Epsom. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) A motion was made by Jack Kelleher to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Dick Todd.. Jay Hickey made a motion to amend the article to reduce the amount by \$55,000, leaving a balance

of \$20,000. It was seconded by Robert Sawyer. A hand vote was taken on the amendment: Yes - 19, no - 118. The amendment was defeated. Back to the original article. The original article passed in the affirmative.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500) Dollars for the purchase of a new police cruiser. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) James Wells made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Connie Pitcher. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to sell the existing 1986 Ford LTD Crown Victoria police cruiser. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Gloria Reeves made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Connie Pitcher. The article was defeated by a voice vote. Robert Yeaton challenged the result and so it was done by a hand count. Yes - 17, No - 132. The article was defeated.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-Four (\$2,744) Dollars in order to join the Central NH Planning Commission. (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee) Connie Pitcher made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Virginia Norberg. The article was defeated.

Article 8: "To see if the Town will vote to establish a Historic District Commission pursuant to RSA 673:1(II) and RSA 673:45-50, or take any other action relating thereto." Connie Pitcher made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Ann Clark. There was a call for a hand vote: Yes - 127, No - 24. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 9: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, pursuant to RSA 673:4(I), to appoint seven (7) citizens as members of the Historic District Commission pursuant to RSA 673:4 and 673:5, and to appoint not more than five (5) citizens as alternate members of the Historic District Commission, pursuant to

RSA 673:6, or take any other action relating thereto." (By Petition) Gloria Reeves made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Connie Pitcher. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 10: "To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Nine Hundred (\$2,900) Dollars to be used for the professional services of a consultant to the Historic District Commission." Petition) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee) Connie Pitcher made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Virginia Norberg.

Kathy Coolidge made a motion to amend the article to reduce the figure to \$200.00 and it was seconded by James The amendment was withdrawn

original article was defeated.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to accept and appropriate funds associated with Epsom's "Anniversary Fund," \$3,944.00 plus interest, and to deposit such funds in the Town's "Computer Fund." Money to be used for the purpose of purchasing new computer equipment. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Jack Kelleher made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. The article was unanimously defeated

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes. (Recommended by the Budget

Committee) Paul Lavoie made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Sam Clark. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from state, federal or another government unit or a private source which becomes available during the year and not require the expenditure of any other Town funds in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Paul Lavioe made a motion to accept the article as read and it was

seconded by Bob Sawyer. The article passed in the affirmative

Return to Article 3: Stewart Yeaton made a motion to accept the proposed Town budget of \$1,030,001.00 and it was seconded by Paul Lavoie.

Keith Cota made a motion to amend the Planning and Zoning line from \$4,760 to \$10,760. The additional \$6,000 to be used for the purpose of developing a Capital Improvements Plan. The motion was seconded by Jay Hickey. The amendment passed in the affirmative.

Paul Lavoie addressed the ambulance question and recommended to the selectmen that they sign with the Suncook Valley Ambulance Service for \$30,000. This is for a guaranteed service, 24 hours/day, 7 days/week. The private contractor will actively bill the customer. Larry Yeaton made a motion to amend the hospital and ambulance line by \$10,000 less and it was seconded by Tony Soltani. The amendment passed in the affirmative.

Peter Burgess made a motion to amend the police department budget to increase it \$16,000 in the area of salaries and it was seconded by Tony Soltani. The amendment passed in the affirmative.

Jack Kelleher made a motion to amend the general assistance line and increase it from \$20,000 to \$23,000 and it was seconded by Marilyn Flanders. On a hand vote, Yes-52, No-44, the amendment passed in the affirmative.

Jack Kelleher made a motion to amend the interest expense and tax anticipation notes line and increase it from \$25,000 to \$32,000 and it was seconded by Marlyn Flanders. On a hand vote, Yes-53, No-49, the amendment passed in the affirmative.

Peggy Tucker made a motion to amend the Visiting Nurse Association line and to increase it by \$1,000 and it was seconded by Barbara Barksdale. The amendment passed in the affirmative.

Tony Soltani made a motion to amend the Soldiers and Sailors line and reduce it from \$5.000 to \$500, and it was seconded by Kathy Coolidge. The amendment passed in the affirmative.

Tony Soltani made a motion to amend the Court Decree Line and reduce it from \$3,000 to \$300 and it was seconded by Maurice Bertot. The amendment was defeated.

Paul Kling made a motion to amend the Winter Maintenance line and to reduce it from \$80,000 to \$70,000 and it was seconded by Kathy Coolidge. The amendment was defeated.

The Bottom Line of the Budget - \$1,048,501.00. The budget passed as amended. Article 3 passed as amended.

The moderator called for an intermission: 1:55 to 2:15.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Fund: Millard Yeaton -\$200.00. Lot is in McClary Cemetery. Interest to be used on his lot and the general welfare of the cemetery. Gary Benner made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Bob Sawyer. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the practice of electing town auditors pursuant to RSA 41:31 and 41:42-A, to authorize the Selectmen to hire independent Certified Public Accountants as needed. Bob Yeaton made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Jack Kelleher. On a hand vote: Yes-24, No-71. The article was defeated.

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Fire Department to enter into Fire Mutual Aid agreements with surrounding Towns that do not currently belong to the Capital Area Fire Aid Compact. Paul Lavoie made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Stewart Yeaton. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote the following: "Effective July 1, 1989, the Epsom Rescue Squad shall be authorized to charge a reasonable fee for each "call" that it responds to with personnel and equipment. Bills shall be made out and sent to the individual treated and/or their insurance company. Proceeds shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund or its equivalent and used as necessary to purchase equipment and/or a new rescue truck. (By Petition) Jack Kelleher made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Hans Wendler. The article was defeated.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote the following: "Effective July 1, 1989, The Epsom Public Library shall require that all its patrons age 6 and above possess a valid Epsom Library card. Library cards shall be issued by Library officials, shall be valid for one year, and cost Ten (\$10) Dollars for students age 6 to 18, and Twenty (\$20) Dollars for adults. (By Petition) The moderator ruled that the warrant article was out of order because it is against the state law. He read RSA 202:5 which says "Every Public library shall remain forever free to the use of every resident of the town wherein it is located."

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell the Town's ownership interest in the Pittsfield Solid Waste incinerator upon such terms and conditions as determined by majority vote of the Board of Selectmen, and to authorize the Selectmen to execute all documents necessary or attendant thereto. Stewart Yeaton made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. On a hand vote: Yes-55, No-39. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 20: To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting. Toni Soltani made a motion to adjourn at 3:00 P.M. and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. The meeting was adjourned.

You are further notified to meet at Epsom Central School in said Epsom on Saturday, the seventeenth (17th) day of March, 1990, at 9:30 A.M. to act upon the following subjects:

- 3. To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the budget committee.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year and not require the expenditure of any other Town funds in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31;95-b.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars for the purpose of reconstructing a section of Goboro Road approximately one half mile in length beginning at the culvert crossing near pole #2500/30 and extending north past the sharp left curve. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

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- 7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a trust fund, pursuant to RSA 31;19, in the name of the late Lillian Morrison for the purpose of holding, managing, investing and expending a bequest from her Last Will which specified that monies were to be used to purchase needed fire department equipment; and to accept said bequest in the principal amount of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars to be placed in the Lillian Morrison Fire Department Trust Fund and to designate the Fire Department as agent to expend sums as authorized and approved by the local legislative body. (Majority Vote Required)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed the interest amount in the Lillian Morrison Fire Department Trust Fund as of 12/31/89 (\$3,247 as calculated by the Town Treasurer) for the purchase of needed fire equipment and to authorize the withdrawal of the sum for this purpose. (Majority Vote Required) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
- 9. the Board of Selectmen as agent to expend sums as authorized and approved by the local legislative body (Majority Vote Required)

- 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand One Hundred (\$20,100) Dollars in order to provide the funds necessary for the Epsom Fire Department, Rescue Squad, to provide Emergency Ambulance Service to anyone in need of such service within the boundaries of the Town of Epsom, and to allow the Town to charge reasonable fees for services rendered. Cato Seavy was a black man who served in Major McClary's Regiment and lived in the house now occupied by the Menards on the corner of Echo Valley and Center Hill.

The following is taken from the history of Rye. "Seavy Cato (colored), April 4, 1829, aged 98 to 108 years. Seavy, Widow, Aug. 7, 1853, aged 77 years." (By Petition)

21: To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 231:43, to discontinue and relinquish all interests of the Town in a certain strip of land, known as "Huckins Road," 30 feet in width adjoining the following described line on the north and west:

Beginning at a bound on the westerly side of Goboro Road at the Cemetery, thence N76°-57'W - 70.0 feet to an iron pin at land formerly of E.J. Stapleton, thence N76°-57'W - 205.8 feet to an iron pin, thence S81°-50'W - 161.0 feet to an iron pin, thence S39°-05'W - 114.1 feet to an iron pin, thence S18°-00'W - 150 feet to an iron pin at Highway Route 4, 9 and 202 also New Hampshire Turnpike, as shown on a survey drawing by E.B. Shiplund, Valuation Engineer, dated June 30, 1914, entitled "Right-of-Way And Track Map. Suncook Valley R.R., Operated by the Boston and Maine R.R.:; also shown on a survey drawing by E.B. Hodgins, dated 1959 and entitled, "Plan Showing Land of Charles N. Huckins, In The Former Suncook Valley RR. Yard, And On Easterly Side of Goboro Road, Epsom, N.H.". Bounded and Described as follows:

"Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV, for an Optional Property Tax Exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability? The Optional Disability Exemption is \$1,400., rather than \$700." (By Petition)

26: To see what action the Town will take upon the following:

Conflict of Interest and Anti-nepotism Ordinance:

1-Definitions:

The following words shall have the following meanings within the context of this ordinance:

Relative: A person within the third degree of relationship to the individual. The degree of relationship being calculated under the Civil Law System.

Official: Any person elected or appointed to an office or position in the government of the Town of Epsom where he/she is vested with the power to make decisions, issue orders, expend funds or participate in any such action as a member of a body.

Benefit: Any change of position to one's advantage, gained by pecuniary methods or otherwise. Such benefit need not necessarily result in another entity's detriment, legal or real.

Official action: The act of issuing of an order, casting a vote, expending funds or any similar action undertaken in official capacity by a town official.

2-Intent:

The intent of this ordinance is to promote competition and engagement of free and unrestricted commerce by persons and business entities in seeking economic transactions with the Town of Epsom and to further economic efficiency in town operation. To promote merit and quality as the primary criteria in choices made among competing persons or entities for such transactions; be it contractual or employment.

3-Conflict of interest:

Except by prior approval as provided in Section 7, no official shall undertake any official action, or participate in any official action, where it is reasonably apparent that the acting official stands to gain any benefit greater than that of any other taxpayer or citizen of the Town of Epsom.

4-Nepotism:

Except by prior approval as provided in Section 7, no official shall undertake any official action, or participate in any official action, where it is reasonably apparent that a relative of the acting official stands to gain any benefit greater than that of any other taxpayer or citizen of the Town of Epsom.

5-Penalty

Any official who violates sections 3 or 4 of this ordinance shall be subject to removal from office and/or \$1000.00 fine per violation.

6-Enforcement:

A-The selectmen of the Town of Epsom shall have the authority to enforce this ordinance.

B-Any citizen/taxpayer of the Town of Epsom shall have the right to petition Merrimack Superior Court for the enforcement of this ordinance.

7-Remedy:

A-Where an official is prohibited to act under Sections 3 or 4; he/she shall refer the action to the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Epsom with a recommendation for action. The Board of Selectmen shall act on the referred question during the next scheduled meeting, by approving or rejecting the recommendation.

B-The Board of Selectmen may delegate the authority conferred in Section 7A to an alternate which they may appoint on an annual basis. Provided, however, that the alternate be a resident of Epsom and detached from the outcome of any decisions or questions referred to him/her for consideration.

8-Defenses:

A-Bona fide emergency necessitating an official action shall be a valid defense to any enforcement proceeding under this ordinance; provided that the action undertaken be of temporary nature and so tailored as to only counter the unforeseen emergency; and a report of the circumstances giving rise to the emergency and the reasonability of its unforeseeability be made, in writing, to the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Epsom within fifteen (15) days of the official action.

B-Prior approval by the Board of Selectmen, and/or their appointed alternate, received prior to the official action, shall be deemed a valid defense to any enforcement proceeding under this ordinance.

9-Jurisdiction:

The Merrimack Superior Court shall have judicial jurisdiction in all enforcement proceedings under this ordinance.

10-Severability:

Should any part of this ordinance be found, adjudicated or otherwise rendered unenforceable the remaining provisions shall remain independently in full force and effect.

11-Date of effect:

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on January 1st, 1991.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS REPORT Mason & Rich Professional Association Fiscal Year 1988 May 5, 1989

We have examined the combined financial statements of the funds and account groups as indexed, of the Town of Epsom, New Hampshire as of and for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1988.. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principals used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The Town has not maintained a complete record of its general fixed assets as required by generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets in not included in the financial statements. The amounts that should be recorded as general fixed assets are not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described above, the aforementioned financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Epsom, New Hampshire as of December 31, 1988 and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as

a whole. The supporting schedules listed in the index are presented for the purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Epsom, New Hampshire.. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Epsom, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1988 we considered the Town's internal control structure to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

However, during our audit we became aware of several matters that are opportunities for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency. The memorandum that accompanies this letter summarizes our comments and suggestions regarding those matters. This letter does not affect our report dated May 5, 1989, on the financial statements of the Town of Epsom, New Hampshire.

We will review the status of these comments during our next audit engagement. We have already discussed many of these comments and suggestions with various Town personnel., and we will be pleased to discuss them in further detail at your convenience. to perform any additional study of these matters, or to assist you in implementing the recommendations.

AUDITORS NOTES ON INTERNAL CONTROLS

Cash Receipts

Finding: Town Clerk does not list permit numbers in cash receipt book. This causes significant lack of control on prenumbered permits.

Recommendation: Permit numbers should be listed in the Town Clerk's cash receipt book. It should be noted

that this is being done in 1989.

Management's Comments: The Town Clerk will be notified of your recommendation concerning the listing of permit numbers in her receipt book and asked to comply.

Cash Disbursements

Finding: Invoices are not being cancelled when paid. This could result in invoices being paid more than once.

Recommendation: We recommend that invoices are cancelled by writing or stamping on the document "paid" and the date.

Finding: Invoices are not signed by department head in Highway Department.

Recommendation: Invoices should be formally signed or initialed and dated by all department heads signifying approval for payment.

Management's Comments: Town officials involved with cash disbursements will be asked to cancel invoices

when paid.

Trust Funds

Finding: A review of Trust Fund Investments shows that most funds are in either savings accounts or investments that result in a fairly low yield.

Recommendation: We suggest that the trustees develop an investment plan that will result in improved vields on Trust Funds.

Management's Comments: Steps have already been taken to insure that Trust Funds be transferred from low yield savings accounts to higher yielding C.D.'s.

THE EPSOM PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

The Town Library is proud to report several important donations this year. The most visible gift is the new sign in front of the building given by the Friends of the Library and by the Robert Yeaton family. The Friends also installed a copier machine which is already in much use.

The most important donation for future use is the land so generously given by Hazel Steele to the Town of Epsom, land which is to be shared with the Library thus enabling the Library to relocate to a larger facility. In a new location the Library would look forward to serving the needs of the larger population of this growing town.

During the past year the usual programs have gone as well as possible at the present site, thanks to our outstanding Librarian Nancy Claris, to the many devoted and hard working volunteers, and to the Friends of the Library. The successful summer program for the children was run by Virginia Drew.

EPSOM POLICE DEPARTMENT

1989 was a year of changes here at the Police Department. There has been, as I am sure there always will be, the increase in traffic related problems with substantial increases of accidents, DWI arrests, and many moving violations. With two major highways running through Epsom, we have all we can do just to keep up with the increase in complaints about other drivers.

We had roughly 8500 calls last year, and believe me they were not all about traffic. Since I have been here more rape cases were investigated this year than the last four years combined. Although I do not have exact figures available, I can tell you that care thefts, burglaries, and all other "Big City Crimes" are here in abundant numbers.

As major crimes are on the increase, the time spent investigating these crimes becomes phenomenal and takes away from time officers have to do neighborhood patrols, making crime in the area rise because everyone is trying to solve the crimes that have already happened. Therefore, now more than ever, it is important to start watching out for your neighbors as well as yourself. Pick up the phone, get involved, report suspicious activities. Call us before it is your house that gets broken into, your car that gets vandalized, or your child who gets hurt.

One thing I would like to point out is that dog complaints are a nuisance to us, as well as the people in your neighborhood. I foresee a policy coming from our department that fines will be mandatory on dog complaints. An officer will be assigned to aggressively go out and find violations and issue summonses. Do yourself a favor, abide by the animal complaint laws. Control your pets before you find out just how much it is going to cost you if you do not comply.

EPSOM RESCUE SQUAD

In 1989, the Epsom Rescue Squad responded to 170 calls, including medical emergencies and motor vehicle accidents. We also responded to 43 calls to assist the Fire Department.

At this time, we have a total of 24 members, 2 are first Responders, 16 are EMT-Ambulance, (most with advanced level skills), 1 Paramedic RN, and 5 new members are currently attending the EMT-A course. Inquiries about membership are always welcome.

We are now operating as a volunteer 1st Response organization, however, the Epsom Rescue Squad has agreed to undertake a proposed Emergency Ambulance Service to the Town of Epsom. The ambulance has been purchased by donations and if accepted, will be given to the Town at Town Meeting 1990. We feel that this is a positive step in the right direction for the Town.

Emergency medical care (Rescue Squad + Ambulance) is available anytime by calling 225-3355.

REPORT OF THE EPSOM FIRE DEPARTMENT

As you can see by the accompanying statistical report, the number of calls were down slightly this year. Of the fire calls that were received, the members performed above expectation and held potentially disastrous situations to a minimum of damage. This excellent record is a direct result of all members taking training seriously thereby preparing themselves to provide fire protection and suppression to the Town of Epsom.

For the first time in recent history, the members were later asked to return to the scene of a fire to view the restoration and redecoration. They were then asked to stay and enjoy cake and ice cream as a thank you for a job well done.

In addition to normal maintenance, major repairs had to be performed to two of our trucks this year. First the tank on the 1970 Mack Tanker and secondly the transmission on the 1975 International had to be replaced. These two large expenses were totally unexpected. Although we have one new truck, the rest of the fleet is aging rapidly.

The proposal by the Rescue Squad to provide Emergency Ambulance Service to the Community required a great deal of time and effort by all members. The ambulance feasibility committee, fund raising committee and ambulance search committee all did an excellent job in providing the Department with the material needed to present this proposal to the taxpayers at Town Meeting.

Special mention and thanks to all the members of the Fire Department Auxiliary. Their support at emergency scenes and in the station during 1989, as in past years, was greatly appreciated by myself and the entire membership.

The members also wish to extend their thanks to the entire community for their support of the Fire Department, the Rescue Squad and the Ladies Auxiliary this past year.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All of these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State law (RSA 224:27), no person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

In order to eliminate false alarms, it is advisable to notify your local fire department whenever you intend to do any outdoor burning.

Violations of RSA 224:27 are a misdemeanor and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression costs (RSA 224:28 and RSA 224:36).

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in the Concord and Chesterfield areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford, New Hampshire.

ROAD AGENT REPORT

For the second time in as many years, Epsom completed a road betterment project. The first was a new bridge over Deer Brook in New Rye, 1988. The second was one mile of North Pembroke Road, also known as Whitehouse Road, 1989. This project consisted of the following:

- 1) Cutting brush and trees
- 2) Establishing ditches and cutting slope where possible
- 3) Installing new culverts
- 4) Stabilizing the base of the road with clean gravel
- 5) Overlaying the road 24' wide with 3" base asphalt
- 6) Overlaying the base asphalt with 1" of finish hot top

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Subdivision of new building lots in Epsom skidded to a halt in 1989. This was mostly due to the overall slump in the housing market in New Hampshire, and possibly indicative of a large supply of lots already available in Epsom. No matter what the cause of the decrease in subdivision/building activity, it is best viewed as being only temporary.

Housing construction is a cyclical industry, but the underlying trend of development in our region will continue for the foreseeable future. Although housing and land prices have dropped in 1989, there has been a dramatic increase in housing and land value compared to

1983, at the beginning of the construction cycle.

The continuing high value of land in Epsom will cause a shift in the character of development in the future. Subdivisions are probably going to be bigger, and thereby have a more immediate effect on the Town's ability to provide services to the new residents. Road improvements, Police and Fire protection capabilities, and certainly school expansion must be considered by the Town. The Town can assign priorities to these future costs by utilizing a Capital Improvements Plan (CIP).

A CIP is prepared by the Planning Board with the recommendations of other Town departments (Police, Roads, School, etc.) to list the expected large capital investments the Town might have in the future. The Planning Board collects the recommendations of capital investments, then proposes a list of priorities to the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee can then ask the Town to spend money on what the Budget Committee considers most

appropriate and cost effective.

The Planning Board has the responsibility of writing a CIP for the Town. Our first consideration is the Town Road System. A Road Management Plan is now partially complete, awaiting the return of warmer weather to finish engineering evaluations of all Town Roads. By next fall, we expect to have a framework CIP ready for the 1991 Budget process. The Planning Board feels that is can best utilize the current slack in housing/development pressure to create a working CIP as the best preparation for the next wave of development.

CENTRAL NEW HAMPSHIRE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is an association of municipalities in Central New Hampshire. Seventeen towns and the City of Concord are within Merrimack County and two towns are within Hillsborough County. Sixteen towns, the City of Concord, and Merrimack County are members in fiscal year 1990. The Town of Epsom is not a voting member of the Commission.

The CNHRPC is organized under RSA 36:45-53, which states that the purpose of the Commission is to prepare a coordinated plan for the development of the region. The statute also enables us to assist communities with local planning activities.

Three planners and one support person are currently employed by the CNHRPC. The staff prepares regional plans and provides professional planning assistance to member communities.

Our accomplishments over the last year include:

Housing: We published Affordable Housing Needs in the Central Region in September, 1989. The report identifies the number of low and moderate income housing units needed and provided in the Region, allocates the deficiency to individual municipalities, creates targets by community for affordable housing, and recommends strategies for use by communities to address local housing needs.

Regional Plan: We adopted and published the "Goals and Objectives Statement" of the regional master plan. Being the heart of the plan, each objective will be addressed. The regional land use element should be completed this fiscal year..

Solid Waste: The Commission prepared and the Central New Hampshire Solid Waste District adopted the District Solid Waste Management Plan. The plan contains a long term strategy to deal with landfill and incineration

requirements, recycling, septic and sludge disposal, and household hazardous waste collection through the year 2005.

Recycling: The Regional Recycling Task Force is investigating methods to implement efficient, comprehensive, and cost-effective recycling throughout the Region. The CNHRPC should soon receive a grant through the Governor's recycling initiative to assist municipalities in obtaining and installing equipment necessary to operate recycling programs.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection: The CNHRPC organized a household hazardous waste collection on October 14, 1989. Co-sponsors were Wheelabrator Concord, LP, the City of Concord, and the Towns of Allenstown, Boscawen, Bow, Canterbury, Dunbarton, Hopkinton, and Pembroke.

HEALTH OFFICER REPORT

During the course of the year, we inspected numerous day care and foster care facilities. Working parents who leave children in licensed facilities should rest assured that our inspections are conducted with the well being of the child as the highest priority.

Within the last two years, the laws and regulations concerning day care have become more stringent. If a person who cares for three or more unrelated children in their home, a license is required by law. To obtain a license, for which there is no fee, you need only the following;

- 1. If a renter, the property owner's written permission
 - 2. An inspection by the Fire Department
 - 3. An inspection by the Health Officer

The license is issued by the State, and is valid for one year.

There is a need for quality, licensed day care within the community, and we are here to assist people, should they desire.

The largest category of activity was septic system problems. Once again, we try to work with the property owner to solve these problems.

Should you have a question, or situation that you feel is health-related, please contact us, during the afternoon weekdays. If you have a bonafide emergency, contact us at anytime. We will assist you as much as we can.

It is also my duty, as Zoning Compliance Officer to investigate any report of non-compliance brought to my attention by the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment or any resident of the Town.

EPSOM CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The following is taken from the publication of Town and City and from a speech by Judson Hale Sr. Editor of Yankee magazine, at the 1989 NHMA Annual Conference. "We New Englanders have traditionally considered ourselves to be special." Our image emanates from many things. Our history, our origins, our landscapes, even our food.

But changes may be wreaking havoc with our identities. According to Hale as he pointed to the fast pace of huge land developing companies selling off little pieces of New England Country life in subdivisions, towns being sued by big developers and communities being forced to hire new expert employees to keep pace with the changes. He also emphasized the environmental concerns of New Englanders who see once tree lined lakes surrounded by condos and mountains that used to be dark and lonely at night now speckled with lights. He sees great hope arising from such activities as land trusts such as the N.H. Trust for N.H. Lands in dealing with some of the regions preservations needs.

All of these programs dance around the theme that the land is for the greater good rather than for the greater profit. He also finds hope in the knowledge that in New England we know who we are. I look forward to the day . . . when every community in New England has taken control again-control that never should have been yielded in the first place. I look forward to the day when we New Englanders are once more in control of our destiny to remain a special region all of America loves, admires, and in a certain sense, actually yearns for.

Here in Epsom there are many acres of land that are very beautiful and should be preserved. These areas are best preserved by Conservation Easements.

These are the areas that are best appreciated by walking. There are natural wonders that were created by the glaciers, as well as the beautiful views, waterfalls, and beaver ponds.

This year the Epsom Conservation was hosted by Dr. and Mrs. Sam Clark with a group of friends on Sanborn Hill Road to discuss Easements in that area. Gail Vaillancourt presented a slide show and answered questions. It was an enjoyable evening and the Clarks were perfect hosts.

We have the sign up on our Easement on Gulf Brook and have done some cutting over there. We would like to clear enough for cross country ski trails. We could use some volunteer help with this project.

There have been several violations of the wetlands and the State has been called in. Most are settled, but there are a few that are in court. It is too bad, but before starting any dredging or filling of the wetland a permit must be obtained from the Wetlands Board in Concord, and from there it is viewed by the Conservation Commission and the site is viewed and discussed by the commission and we report back to the Wetlands Board.

Again this year we bought wildlife plants which were set out along the Suncook River.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Epsom: Home Care, Hospice, and Health Promotion.

HOME CARE SERVICES respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and paraprofessional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

HOSPICE SERVICES provide professional and paraprofes-sional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical and emotional needs. This is the only certified Medicare Hospice Program in New Hampshire.

HEALTH PROMOTION SERVICES focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, aduit screening, immunizations, and HIV testing and counseling. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior Health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and paraprofessional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families, and individuals through early intervention and health teaching.

Health Education and Instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Epsom may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) between the hours of 8:00am - 4:00pm seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. A Hospice nurse in on call 4:00pm - 8:00am daily.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for that person without a health plan who is unable to pay the full charge. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This Agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of NH and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) for Pipe Cleaning and authorize the withdrawal from the Epsom Village District Pipe Cleaning Fund (Expendable Trust) established at the 1987 Village District meeting for this purpose. (Proposed areas-Black Hall Road/from Pumphouse #1 to Route 4) (Recommended by Budget Committee).

MINUTES OF ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 16, 1989

The annual meeting of the Epsom School District was held on March 16, 1989 at the Epsom Central School. The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Paul Martell.

Article 1: To Hear the Reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Chairperson of the School Board, Dianna Parichand introduced Superintendent Paul DeMinico of the SAU #53, Bruce Farr, Epsom School Principal, members of the School Board and the School District Officers. Ms. Parichand's remarks concerned the new lower level addition to the school, which included three extra classrooms, the good results that the school was receiving from the new Math specialist and the invaluable help from SCOPE volunteers. At this time, Ms. Parichand also made a presentation of a special building award to Tom Lalish who had served as the Supervisor of the building needs committee and praised his very hard work. While Mr. Lalish was not present to receive the award, there was a plaque presented in his honor.

This article was approved by Robert Sawyer and then seconded by Gloria Reeves. There being no discussion, the article was put to a vote and was passed.

Article 2: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to accept gifts and donations from any source on behalf of the School District.

This article was approved by Robert Sawyer and then seconded by Gloria Reeves. There being no discussion, the article was put to a vote and was passed.

Article 3: By petition to see if the District will adopt the following article: To see if the voters will approve of the following contract ratification proposal: Effective March 16, 1989, any contract and/or agreement made by the Epsom School Board involving teacher and/or

administrative salary or benefit increases must be submitted in Warrant Article form to the voters of the Epsom School District for their approval at their annual School District Meeting in March. No salary or benefit increases shall be enacted without such approval.

This article was approved by Jack Kelleher and seconded by M. Berto. Jack Kelleher then spoke in behalf of the article. He stated that people in town needed to be able to have more control over the costs involved in education - that it was a better way of doing business when both sides could confer with each other. Frank Catanese spoke against the article as he did not believe it would truly help us to achieve control, unless there was a belief that the School Board was currently doing a bad job, he could not see the need for this and we should leave control of contracts with the School Board. Charles Yeaton said he was against the article as it was an indication that we did not trust our School Board. He believed that the Board spends the year working with the school and understands what is needed. The town is still able to make cuts from the bottom line of the budget when they felt it was necessary. Alan Bull said he hoped this would not pass as he had seen this where he formerly lived in Maine and it had created many problems, such as never being able to hire the more experienced teachers who would demand a higher salary. There were many more comments from people, for and against, the greater number of comments being against.

Moderator, Paul Martell, then read the article again and he read the petition, signed by seven legal voters of the District and requesting that the article be voted on by secret ballot. The voting was then done, by secret written yes or not ballots. There were 55 yes and 86 no votes. Article 3 on contract ratification was denied.

Article 4: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept, and expend without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other Governmental units or a private source which becomes available during the 1989-90 school fiscal year, provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the

expenditure of other school funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money and have the approval of the Municipal Budget Committee.

This article was approved by Marilyn Walker and seconded by Mr. Bretton. After some discussion, this article was put to a vote and Article 4 was passed.

Article 5: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$47,126 for the purpose of maintaining the physical plant of the Epsom Central School which includes the reroofing of the original building and the 1964 addition and the maintenance of the 1982 roof; and to authorize the expenditures of sweepstakes revenues in the amount of \$47,126 distributed by the Department of Education under the provisions of the 1988 New Hampshire Laws; Chapter 278 the fund appropriation. (Budget Committee Recommends Approval)

This article was approved by Dr. Wells and seconded by Jay Hickey. This article was voted on and was passed.

Article 6: To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for School District Officials and Agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

This article was approved by Mr. Keeler and seconded . Moderator then asked for approval for the by \$2,312,481 budget. Bob Yeaton made an amendment to the budget, as follows, to reduce the amount of the budget to \$2,272,481, eliminating monies for the assistant principal The amendment was seconded by Mr. Lavoie. position. Jack Kelleher spoke in favor of the amendment as he believed we could live on less, we were not the only school with this amount of students and no assistant principal. In response to a question from Sonia Noyes, Gary Benner explained in detail what the duties of the assistant principal would be. Gary Matteson asked Principal Bruce Farr how many students he felt would justify the hiring of an assistant principal, the answer from Mr.. Farr was '500' and the amount of students which we now have is '375'.

After much more discussion, Moderator Paul Martell read the amendment again, to reduce the budget to \$2,272,481. There was a hand vote, 70 yes and 46 no. The new bottom line of the budget now becomes \$2,272,481. At this time Mr. Tony Soltani moved to make another amendment to the line 2320, regarding membership in the SAU, and to reduce the item fro \$65,059 to \$15,868 and reducing the bottom line to \$2,256,613. This amendment was seconded by Jack Kelleher. After some discussion this amendment was put to a hand vote. There were 14 yes votes and 82 no votes, the amendment was not passed, and the bottom line in the budget went back to \$2,272,481.

The amended budget was then put to hand vote, 114 yes and 0 no. The budget article was then passed.

Article 7: To choose agents and committees in relation to any subjects embraced in the District.

There was no discussion and no action.

Article 8: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

There was some minor discussion of other ways in which we might solve some of our problems, a middle school, etc. Motion was made to adjourn the meeting by Ken Preve at 9:22 p.M. and the meeting was adjourned.

AUDITORS REPORT Brent W. Washburn, CPA December 11, 1989

I was engaged to audit the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Epsom School District for the year ended June 30, 1989 and have issued my report thereon, dated December 11, 1989. As part of my examination, I reviewed and tested the District's system of internal accounting controls to the extent I considered necessary to evaluate the systems as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon to determine the nature, timing and extent of such auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

The objective of internal control is to provide reasonable but not absolute assurance as to safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use of disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily required estimates and judgements by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgement, carelessness or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect to the estimates and judgements required in the preparation of financial statements. Further projection of any evacuation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

My study and evaluation of the District's system of internal accounting control for the year ended June 30, 1989 which was set forth in the first paragraph, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system or detect fraud, if any should exist.

The following items related to the internal accounting control system merit your consideration:

- 1. Unsecured Cash. Federal insurance of the bank deposits amounts to \$100,000. At one point during the year the general checking account bank account had a balance of \$540,180.42. The financial strength of the banks in general has been deteriorating, and the financial strength of the Suncook Banks is not known to me. I recommend that the School Board try to negotiate an arrangement with the bank thereby that amounts above \$100,000 would be collateralized with bank assets.
- 2. Computer Training The financial information is maintained on a computer. The training of employees operating the computer has improved from the previous year. Additional training is recommended in the area of reconciling the general control balances to the detailed reports generated by the system.
- 3. Purchase Orders Presently purchase orders are being issued at many different areas by anyone who needs to purchase material. It is recommended that the purchase order issuance be centralized and persons needing to purchase material submit a request for a purchase order.
- 4. Inventory of Fixed Assets As is the practice with many New Hampshire School Districts, the Epsom School District has not maintained a record of its fixed assets. In order to adequately maintain control of its existing fixed assets, I recommend the District cause an inventory of these assets as soon as practical. As part of their long-term policies, District officials should initiate fixed asset records. Cost or consideration given is the general accepted method for valuing fixed assets, and should be recorded on all new acquisitions. Where adequate documentation of cost is unavailable for existing fixed assets, an estimate of the original cost is an acceptable standard under accounting

principles for governmental entities. The existence of fixed asset records will not only aid district officials in their control of these assets, but should be an invaluable tool in long-range planning.

- 5. School Lunch Sales Very little control exists over School Lunch receipts. I recommend that the District investigate the feasibility of implementing control mechanisms at the point of sale.
- 6. Student Activity Funds Included in the Student Activities Funds is the athletic account, sums are transferred from the General Fund to this account and individual checks are issued from the athletic account to referees and umpires at the time the games are played. This activity should be accounted for under the General Fund.
- 7. Miscellaneous Revenue Reimbursements have been classified as miscellaneous revenue. They should be offset against the original expense classification. I recommend that a schedule be maintained and an adjustment at year end be made to reclassify the reimbursements from miscellaneous revenue.

Publication Requirement The provisions of R.S.A. 71-A:21 require that only this shall be published in the next annual report of the School District. However, I suggest that you consider the publication of the entire report which includes auditor's opinion, financial statements and notes to financial statements.. No portion of either the Auditor's opinion, financial statement or notes to financial statements may be published separately.

I extend my thanks to the officials and employees of Epsom School District for their assistance during the course of my audit.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

In my preparation for the writing of this report, I had reviewed the reports of the past three years. It was quite apparent, in my review of those reports, that elementary standards and space needs were major areas in need of addressing. While enrollment has decreased slightly, future enrollment projections show that this decrease may provide only short term relief. We will need to address space needs for the future as facilities in the area of counseling, art speech, conferencing and teacher work space are inadequate.

Our progress toward meeting elementary standards has been excellent. With vote approval of the 1990-91 school budget, all staffing standards will have been met. With voter approval of the proposed new kindergarten program, the Epsom School District will receive state approval with distinction. The community's support of its schools has been excellent and we urge and need your continued support.

The Epsom School District has joined the other SAU #53 communities in participating in the federally funded Chapter I program. Students in grades one through eight are selected for tutorial assistance in reading and mathematics based on achievement test results and teacher recommendations. Epsom's current allocation of \$33,211 funds two tutors along with the purchase of instructional and assessment materials. SAU #53 was the recipient of a Certificate of Recognition from the Department of Education in Washington, D.C. for our work in improving education for disadvantaged children. I thank our program director, Janey Snyder, and the Chapter I tutors for their outstanding efforts.

The 1989 fall standardized test scores for grades four and eight continue to show both increases as well as decreases in achievement when compared with past year's results. Results of test scores are used by teachers in their evaluation of curriculum and areas of instructional emphasis (or lack of emphasis). Scores assist us in making program decisions and decisions related to teaching strategies. As reported to you in previous years, test scores

are important and one of many indicators of school success. Please contact the school for any further discussion about standardized test scores.

I wish to thank the Teachers of Epsom Central School for their series of program reports to the School Board and to interested members of the community. The extra time and effort in preparing these evening programs are just another avenue for reaching out to the community.

The School Community Organization Program for Everyone was active last year. I thank all of those who participated in this organization as well as those who offered their volunteer assistance to the school.

The demand for good teachers and good teaching is quite apparent. Parents and teachers are the most important people in the educational lives of our children. For our schools to do the kind of job expected by you, we need to take measures to retain the best teachers and hire quality teachers. Your support of the new teacher contract is essential if we are to achieve this goal. I strongly urge you to support our efforts in providing a quality education for the children of Epsom by voting in favor of the School Board's proposal budget.

On behalf of my office staff, I thank you for your continued support of the Epsom School District and of SAU #53. I look forward to working with you in providing the very best education for the children of Epsom.

EPSOM CENTRAL SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

Over 2,000 student visits were made to the Health Office during the school year for first aid, illness, health counseling, and social issues. Screening programs continued in the areas of: hearing, vision, scoliosis, and blood pressure; inspections for pediculosis and nutritional assessments. Referrals and follow up care were given as needed, as were nursing treatments.

Students continued to receive financial assistance from the School Nurse Student Health Association for; medicine, vision care and glasses, and medical and dental care. These are private funds secured through the cooperation of the Suncook Bank and several businesses and organizations throughout SAU #53.

The Lion's Club of Northwood generously provided the school with a new audiometer for the screening of all students for hearing.

All students at Epsom Central School have been properly immunized for school attendance. Students continue to be made aware of personal health needs and importance of their own health and immunization history.

The Pittsfield Medical Association again conducted "athletic physical examinations" at the school in the spring with 48 students participating. We thank them for their support and efficiency.

The Dental Health conference did not take place this year due to a lack of dental hygienists. We are hopeful for 1989-90, however, the future of the state dental bureau may be threatened by budget cuts.

Health education continues for all students with focus on having students taking responsibility for themselves and others. Chief Burgess conducted bicycle safety classes, the Epsom Fire Department gave fire safety demonstrations and the Epsom Rescue Squad demonstrated rescue methods. The school nurse continues to teach "Health Awareness" for grade 8 and team teacher Human Growth and

Reproduction Grades 5-8. First Aid for grade 6 was taught by Janet Allen, who was certified by Red Cross. We are proud of the efforts of Tanya Weaver, an 8th grade student who exemplified what health education hopes to accomplish, skill and courage to apply her knowledge in a life threatening situation. Our nutritional component was again supported by the hot lunch program staff, who encouraged classes to plan menus and invite parents to lunch at school. It was also put into practice with nutritional snacks being sold at the school store which was run by S.C.O.P.E. volunteers Linda Martel and Hannah Weisenburger. Grade 5 and 6 students were involved by selling items daily, under the direction of Mrs. Saulnier.

All our programs have been successful as a result of the caring and cooperation of the school staff and individuals and organizations in the community. We also appreciate the support of the School. Board, the Superintendent and the Principal, as well as the many parents and volunteers who have assisted us this year.
