In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of the 7th July 1838 entitled "an Act granting half pay and pension to certain widows."

On the twenty eighth day of August, 1838. Personally appeared before the undersigned the County of Probate in and for the County of Merrimack and State of New Hampshire

Pratt Fullbricks, a resident of Epsom in the County and State of New Hampshire, aged 81 years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on her oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress passed July 7th 1838. entitled "an Act granting half pay and pension to certain widows."

That she is the Widow of Daniel Fullbricks who was a private in the army of the Revolution. That according to her best knowledge and belief, he served more than Eleven Months in the Service of the United States, in the New Hampshire Continental line.

That he was a Pensioner under the Act of Congress of 4th June 1832, on the New Hampshire wing of the route of 38.66 for years, (pensioned under the head of Merrimack County)

She further declares she was married to the said Daniel Fullbricks in Concord on the Eleventh day of February Anno Domini 1779, as will more fully appear by proof hereunto annexed.

That her husband the aforesaid Daniel Fullbricks - (Died) - at Epsom on the 15th day of April 1835, as will appear by proof hereunto annexed.

That she was not married to him (her aforesaid husband) prior to his leaving the service with the marriage took place previous to the first day of January Seventeen hundred and ninetyfour, viz. of the time when the Statute -

She further declares she was never after words married and she remains a widow.

DECLARATION.

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832,

On this *twenty eighth* day of *August* 1832, personally appeared in open Court before the Judge of the *District Court of U.S.* *for N.H.* *now sitting,* *Daniel Philbrick* a resident of *Epsom* in the County of *Merrimack* and State of N. H. aged *78* years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated—

The said Daniel Philbrick deponeth and saith that he entered the service the 20th day of April 1775 and served until the first day of January 1776 in Col. Voss Regiment and Capt. Morris Sawtells Company. He further deponeth that he again entered the service as an orderly Sergeant in 1777 and served three months in Col. Dickes Regiment and Capt. Morris Sawtells Company and was present and assisted in the capture of General Burgoyne—

Daniel Philbrick

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State.

Sworn to and subscribed, the day & year aforesaid *Charles W. Tuttle* *Daniel Philbrick* *Thomas R. Swett* residing in *Ellisfield* and *Daniel Swett* residing in *Gilmanton* hereby certify, that we are well acquainted with *Daniel Philbrick*, who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration; that we believe him to be *78* years of age; that he is reputed and believed, in the neighborhood where he resides, to have been a soldier of the Revolution, and that we concur in that opinion.

Sworn and subscribed the day & year aforesaid *Charles W. Tuttle* *Daniel Swett* And the said Court do hereby declare their opinion, after the investigation of the matter, and after putting the interrogatories prescribed by the War Department, that the above named applicant was a Revolutionary Soldier, and served as he states. And the Court certifies, that it appears to them that *Thomas R. Swett* who has signed the preceding certificate, is resident in the town of *Ellisfield* and that *Daniel Swett*, who has also signed the same is a resident in the town of *Gilmanton* and are credible persons, and that their statement is entitled to credit.

Charles W. Tuttle Clerk of the District Court do hereby certify that the foregoing contains the original proceedings of the said Court, in the matter of the application of *Daniel Philbrick* for a pension.
