DECLARATION.

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of the 7th of June, 1832.

State of New-Hampshire, } ss.
County of Merrimack - }

On this <sup>29th day of July 1832 — personally appeared before the Judges of the Court of Probate
for the County named John Ham — a resident of Epsom — in the County of
Merrimack and State of New-Hampshire, aged Eighty Eight years, who being first duly sworn,
according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision
made by the act of Congress, passed June 7th, 1832. That he enlisted in the army of the United States in the
year 1780 — with Capt. Prescott — and served in the Col: Henry Dearborn
regiment of the continental — line, under the following named officers :

that he enlisted in Epsom many in the County of Merrimack and
State aforesaid in the Month of June 1780 for six Months under
Capt. Prescott in the continental service and Marched to
Kingston in the County of Buckingham and State aforesaid
and there passed Muster, Battalions were muster Master and
there marched to New Point and there was paid into Capt. Pay's
Company Ensign W. Coffey in Col: Dearborn Regt. marched
to Warren Town New Jersey (so called), thence Salding Fortune
so called near Fishkill in the State of New York, during the
full term of six Months, and was discharged by Ensign W. Coffey
in the absence of the Col: had a written discharge but has lost it.</sup>

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity, except the present, and he declares
that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any agency in any State.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

And the said Court do hereby declare their opinion, that the above named applicant was a revolutionary soldier,
and served as he states.

I William Miller of Northwood in the County of Rockingham
and State of New Hampshire being seventy nine years old
before today that I served seven years in the Continental
Army of the United States Army during the War of the Revolution
in Capt. Hinsman's Morris & other Captain's in the Regiment
commanded by Col. Stark & Col. Lally; that, during one
of those years in which I served, I think the year -
1780 - John Horne of Epsom in the County of Merrimack
served in the same continental Army of the United States
Army as a private soldier in the company commanded by
Capt. Way in Col. Dearborn's Regiment - I and the
said John Horne lived about one mile from each other
in said Epsom and in said Northwood - and I knew him well
in the Army & frequently saw him while at West Point and
at Warren Town in the State of New Jersey. Also at a place
called Soldiers Fortune near Hicksville in the State of
New York where he was regularly discharged
having served out the time of his enlistment
which I then understood to be six months -
