On this 30th day of June,
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and forty three, personally appeared
before Isaac N. Wall, one of the Assistant Judges of the
County Court, within and for the County of Caledonia aforesaid
Eleanor Randall, a resident of Cabot in said County,
in the eightieth year of her age, who, being first duly
sworn, according to law, doth, on her oath, make the
following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the
provision made by the Act of Congress passed the 7th
July 1838, and the 23 of August 1842, granting pensions
to widows of persons who served during the war of the
Revolution; that she is the widow of Jonathan Randall
deceased, who was a soldier in the New Hampshire Militia,
and a pensioner of the United States, under act 7th
June 1835, on the Vermont Agency, at the rate of forty
four dollars ⁸⁷ per annum, for his Military Service, set
forth in the original declaration, now on file in the War
Department, and to which reference is respectfully
made, in support of this application.

She also declares that she was married to the said
Jonathan Randall on the twenty seventh day of October,
in the year of our Lord, one thousand seven hundred
and eighty three, as will be shown by a leaf taken
from a family record herewith annexed, and that
no other record can be found of the fact.

She further declares that her said husband died
on the 5th day of February 1840; that she was
not married to him, prior to his leaving the service,
but previous to the 1st January 1794. Just as stated
above; and that she has not remarried since the
death of her husband.

On this 9th day of July A.D. 1832 personally appeared before the Probate Court now sitting at Danville within and for the District of Caledonia aforesaid Jonathan Randall a resident of Cabot in the County, District and State aforesaid aged seventy three years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 - That immediately after the intelligence of the battle at Lexington reached Chester in the State of New Hampshire the then place of his residence he volunteered under Captain Hutchins without engaging for any particular time and marched to a place called Winter hill near Boston in the State of Massachusetts and remained in the service he is confident at least one month.

That in the month of April 1776, at said Chester, he enlisted for the term of six months in the New Hampshire militia or state troops, marched to and served the whole term of six months at Great Island so called near Portsmouth in said State of New Hampshire, lying just below Portsmouth at the mouth of the Piscataqua river in the company of Captain Brown and in the regiment of Colonel Gilman, Major Mooney being the major of said regiment, Lieutenant Aiken and Ensign Gordon being the subaltern officers of said company.

That about the latter part of May or the fore part of June in the year 1780 he enlisted in the army of the United States as he believes on the Continental establishment for the term of

six months at Epsom in the State of New Hampshire being
the then place of his residence) - in the New Hampshire line
in Colonel Dearborn's regiment in a company called the
Major's company - thinks the Major's name was White
the Lieutenant of the company was Adjutant of the
regiment - his name was Boynton - The company was
usually commanded by Ensign Neal M. Gaffy - marched
from Epsom to Kingston New Hampshire where he passed
muster - thence to Worcester, Massachusetts and from
thence to West point in the State of New York - spent
most of the season below ~~New York~~ West point at Orange-
town and in that vicinity - was discharged near West-
point about the latter part of November 1780

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever ^{to} a pension
or an annuity except the present and he declares that
his name is not on the pension roll of any agency in
any state.

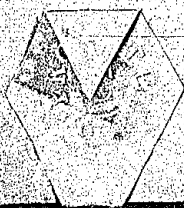

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request additional information in regard to certain Revolutionary War soldiers with names Jonathan, Benjamin, Joseph, Billings and Samuel Reynolds variously spelled Rannolds, Randol, Randal, Randle, Randolph, Runnals, etc.

An effort has been made to aid you in your research and several records furnished you, Jonathan Reynolds, W.16692, Jonathan Reynolds, S.14258, Benjamin Reynolds, W.18806 and others.

There is no claim for pension on file based upon service in the Revolutionary War of a Samuel Reynolds who served in the New York Troops or who applied for pension while residing in that state, or of a Billings Reynolds. No other record has been identified of a Benjamin Reynolds. The records have been found of a Jonathan Randall and a Joseph Randall which may be of interest to you. All spellings of the surname have been used in search of the records. The data given herein were obtained from the respective claims for pension based upon service in the Revolutionary War of the two soldiers designated.

Jonathan Randall

Jonathan Randall was born March 27, 1759, at Rye, New Hampshire. The names of his parents are not shown in the papers in the pension claim.

While residing at Chester, New Hampshire, he belonged to a company of militia commanded by Captain True and upon receipt of the news of the battle of Bunker Hill, was one of twenty men selected for service, marched to Winter Hill, near Boston, in Captain Hutchins' Company, Colonel Poor's New Hampshire Regiment, and served one month.

In April, 1776, Jonathan Randall again enlisted and served six months as a private in Captain Brown's Company, Colonel Gilman's New Hampshire Regiment and was stationed at "Great Island", just below Portsmouth, New Hampshire, during the whole of this tour. He moved to Epsom, New Hampshire, and while residing there, enlisted about June 1, 1780 and served six months as a private in what was called the "Major's Company" under Major Waite and Colonel Dearborn.

Could not locate this island as quoted

Formed as a soldier in the British army in 1776. He was also that he was enrolled in 1780

In 1784, he settled in London, New Hampshire, and after living there for ten years, moved to Cabot, Caledonia County, Vermont, of which place he was a resident when he was allowed pension on his application executed July 9, 1832.

He died February 5, 1840, place not stated.

Did not say maiden name, not given. Cause there was a record of marriage written by sol. in which he gave her as Eleanor Randall & I thought perhaps her maiden name might have been Randall

The soldier married October 27, 1783, at Epping, Rockingham County, New Hampshire, Eleanor, who was born October 17, 1763.

Soldier's widow, Eleanor, was allowed pension on her application executed June 30, 1843, while residing in Cabot, Vermont. In December, 1843, she was residing in Pawlet, Vermont, to be near her son, Jonathan Randall.

No names of children other than the above noted Jonathan are given and there are no further family data.

Joseph Randall was born in Canada. The date of his birth and the names of his parents are not shown in the papers in the pension claim. The name also appears as Rendell.

In 1775, while a resident of Saint Four, Lower Canada, he joined Captain Labonteux' Company of the American Army at Quebec and was in the battle of Quebec; he returned home in March, 1776, and in May, 1776, assisted in taking a British frigate. He enlisted at Albany, New York, in the fall of 1776, in Captain Loussaux' Company, Colonel Livingston's Continental Regiment, served over three years and was at the surrender of Burgoyne, battle of Rhode Island and several skirmishes.
