DECLARATION.

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of the 7th of June, 1832.

State of New-Hampshire, } ss.
County of Grafton

On this first day of Jan 1888 personally appeared before the Judge of the Court of Probate
Joseph Moulton a resident of Ellsworth in the County of
Grafton and State of New Hampshire, aged 66 years, who being first duly sworn
according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the pro-
vision made by the act of Congress, passed June 7th 1832. That he enlisted in the army of the United
States in the year _____ with _____ and served in the
regiment of the _____ line, under the following named officers:

That he entered into the service of the United States
and served as herein stated. That in the Month of July
A.D. 1778 he enlisted into a Company commanded by Capt.
Hoodman in Col. Bannister's Regiment (does not recollect
which name). Regt. & Co. He followed for six Months
Marched from Exeter N.H. to North then to Otter creek
thence to Saratoga and was at the taking of Gen. Burgoyne
thence he marched to Fort Edwards - thence to Manah-
-atten - thence to Shinnecock and thence back to N.H.
when he was discharged having served his six Months
He was born in Old Hampton N.H. 1764 - has no
record of his age - lived at Exeter when called into
service & since the Revolutionary War has lived a
short time in Rochester & for the last thirty two years
has lived in Exeter as aforesaid - does not recollect
the names of other Officers except above named except his
Lieut. whose name was Randall - He received a dis-
-charge signed by his Co. which he has lost -
He refers to the Rev. Israel Bishop & Solomon Webber
by whom ^{he is} known in his present neighbor-
-hood & who can testify as to his character for veracity
& true doing of his services as a Soldier of the Revolution

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity, except the present, and he de-
clares that his name is not on the Pension roll of any agency in any State.

Concerning N.H. Indians

State of New Hampshire, {
County of Grafton } S.S.

On this twenty seventh day of August, A.D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty one, personally appeared before me, a Justice of the Peace within and for the County and State of said Sarah Moulton, aged seventy nine years, a resident of Rumney, in said State of New Hampshire, who being duly sworn according to law, declares that she is the widow of Joseph Moulton deceased, who was a private in the Company commanded by some person now to her unknown, in the Revolutionary war, the time and place of whose enlistment she does not now recollect, that her said husband, Joseph Moulton, continued in actual service in said war for the term of two months and twenty days and was taken sick and was discharged at the time and place of which she does not now recollect.

She further states that she was married to the said Joseph Moulton, she thinks, in June, ~~seventeenth~~ A.D. 1838, by one Robert Nothys, an ordained minister, and that her name before her said marriage was Sarah Elles; that her said husband died at Ellsworth on the eighth day of November, A.D. 1844, and that she is now a widow.

She further states that her said husband's name was inscribed upon the Pension Roll of the United States, and that he drew a pension for the term of thirteen years, she thinks, living to his death.

She further states that she applied for and obtained a land warrant under the law "granting bounty land to certain officers and soldiers who have been engaged in the military service of the United States," and that she made her declaration about three years ago; and that she hereby makes reference to said declaration with the accompanying papers therewith filed in the Pension Office at Washington, and she also refers to the papers on file in relation to her said husband's pension; and she thinks her said husband enlisted at Epping, N.H., or in Newmarket, N.H.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the pension to which she may be entitled under the Pension Law of the United States. And she further declares that she has not received an office for a pension, previous to this application under any of the laws of the United States.

and say that we are ^{Daughter and Grandsons} sons of Joseph Moul-
ton deceased who was a Soldier in the war
of the Revolution and received a Pension under
the Act of 1832. that our said father died in
the town of Ellsworth on the eighth day of Novem-
ber A.D. 1844 and we attended his funeral;
that he left a widow who still survives and whose
name is Sarah Moulton and who still re-
mains a widow: that the said Sarah was
our father's second wife and that she was
married to him on the twentieth day
of June 1838 ^{as we understand and believe} in the town of Middleton
in the State of New Hampshire and they lived
together as husband and wife ever after their
said marriage until our father's death; that we
have no interest her claim for bounty land
we further state that we ^{are} care of them both and that he
died in our house.
