DECLARATION.

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of the 7th of June, 1832.

State of New-Hampshire, } ss.  
County of Merrimack

On this 8<sup>th</sup> day of September 1832 personally appeared before the Judge of the Superior Court of Probate in Derry,  
Samuel Lecor a resident of Exeter in the County of  
Merrimack and State of New-Hampshire, aged seventy years, who being first duly sworn,  
according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision  
made by the act of Congress, passed June 7th, 1832. That he enlisted in the army of the United States in the  
year 1780 with Capt. George Washington and served in the Col. Henry Dearborn's  
regiment of the continental line, under the following named officers:

That he enlisted at Rye in the County of Rockingham and State  
of New Hampshire in May 1780 for six months under Jonathan  
Locke & Nathan, Capt a commissary for the town of Rye appointed  
and marched to Brattleboro & from thence marched  
directly to West Point, under them to whom this company commanded  
by Lt Jonathan Gilley was under his command a few weeks  
then under Lt Capt. went from West Point to Orange town N.Y. and  
thence to English Meigsborough (so called) known to a place called  
Hacksnietack, thence back to Orange town thence to West Point  
thence to Soldiers Fortun, where he was taken out of his company  
as a gunner and put under the command of Capt Elizur Thayer Lt  
Blodget & Enr. Rich and a marched down the River about eight  
miles to a village (the name of which he cannot remember) where  
he served until the expiration of his six months & was there honorably  
discharged by Lt Capt who came from Soldiers Fortun to the village  
above mentioned and brought his discharge which he afterwards  
sent to Exeter N.H. to get his pay & has never been able to find it since  
That the above named service was in Col. Henry Dearborn's  
Regiment in the continental line

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity, except the present, and he declares  
that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any agency in any State.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

and served as he states.

for a pension.
