County of Strafford } On this 25<sup>th</sup> day of April A.D. 1818 before  
me the subscriber one of the judges of the Court of Common  
pleas for said County personally appears Heymouth Waller  
aged sixty seven years resident in the Town of Lempwick  
County and State aforesaid who being by me first duly sworn  
concerning to lay forth on his oath make the following  
declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the late  
act of Congress entitled An act to provide for certain per-  
sons engaged in the land and naval service of the United  
States in the revolutionary war That he the said Hey-  
mouth Waller in May 1775 enlisted in the Town of Sp-  
erson in said state for eight months and entered the  
aforesaid service in the company commanded by Captain  
Henry Dearborn and regiment commanded by Col John  
Stark New Hampshire line he continued to serve until June  
following when in the battle of Bunkerhill he was wounded  
and so much disabled that he did no more duty during  
said entitement that sometime about the month of  
January 1776 he enlisted at winterhill for one year  
in the company regiment and line aforesaid that he  
continued to serve in said service of the United States in said

won on the continental establishment from January 1778 until  
the last of December following or first of January 1779 when he  
was dismissed from service at New York in the state of New York  
that he had no written discharge that he was in the battle of  
~~Bunker Hill where he was wounded in consequence of which~~  
wound he has since drawn a small pension from said  
United States and that he is in received circumstances  
and stands in need of the assistance of his country for  
support — Sworn to and declared before me the day  
and year aforesaid — William Badger

I William Badger judge as aforesaid do certify that  
it appears to my satisfaction that the said Wm. Badger did  
serve in the revolutionary war as stated in the preceding declaration  
against the common enemy for the term of nine months on the Con-  
tinental establishment and that he is in received circumstances and stands  
in need of the assistance of his country for support and I nowhere  
omit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me  
to the Secretary for the Department of War pursuant to the direc-  
tions of the aforementioned act of Congress —

To the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas now sitting at Concord, New-Hampshire, and for the County of Strafford  
and State of New-Hampshire, on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of July, 1820.

Weymouth Wallace, aged 69 years, resident in Sandwich, in said County, comes  
into court, and in pursuance of an act of Congress passed on the 1st day of May, 1820, brings with him, and in his  
proper person exhibits to said Court a Schedule by him subscribed, containing his whole Estate and Income, his  
necessary clothing and bedding excepted, as follows:

Estate of 75 acres of Poor Land Land with the Buildings  
thereon standing.

Live Stock 2 Cows - 1 3/4 y.o. heifer 1-2 year old. Gleifer 1 ox

And the said Weymouth Wallace in pursuance as aforesaid produgeth to said Court the  
following oath by him duly taken and subscribed, viz.

I, Weymouth Wallace, do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the  
18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my  
property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an act  
of Congress, entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United  
States in the revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in  
trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is con-  
tained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

And the said Weymouth Wallace doth here in Court further declare on oath, that he served in the rev-  
olutionary war as follows, viz.

Nine months in Capt. Henry Dearborn's (since  
Secretary at War) Company, and was wounded in the battle  
of Lexington in year 1775 - one year in the Regiment  
commanded by Col. John Stark, 1st Co. Company com-  
manded by Capt. Elmer Sill, commencing in November  
in December 1776 & ending 1777.

That the date of his original declaration in order to obtain a pension is ~~about~~ 25 1818 and the number of his pension certificate is 13,456 — That his occupation is that of a Farmer & has not sufficient ability to pursue it. That the number and names of his family residing with him, and their ages and capacities to contribute to their support, are as follows, viz:

1 wife daughter married Hattie Wallace aged 29 years  
1 Granddaughter named Lowina Brown aged 21 years. 1 Grandson aged 8 years in common habit but without any property.

Wherefore he prays the opinion of the said Court as to the value of the property contained in the said schedule, and that the same, together with a copy of the premises be duly certified to the Secretary of War.

1820 (Solemnly affirmed in open Court before the Court of  
Records for the County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire)  
Weymouth Wallace, a Resident in said County aged Seventy Two  
years, to his being first duly sworn according to law deposes and says  
that he make this following declaration in order to obtain the power  
now made by the acts of Congress of the 18th March 1818 and  
the 1st of May 1820 that he the said Weymouth Wallace enlisted  
for the term of nine months in May 1776 at Ipswich in the  
State of New Hampshire in the Company commanded by Captain  
Ames Morrill in the Regiment Commanded Colonel John Stark  
in the line of the State of New Hampshire on the continental establish-  
ment and at the expiration of said nine months he the said Wey-  
mouth Wallace again enlisted for the further sum of one year in the same  
Company & Regiment in the line of the State of New Hampshire on the  
Continental Establishment, and that he continued to serve in said corps  
from the time of his first said enlistment until December 1777 when  
he was discharged from the service in Lower Canada that he was  
wounded in the battle of Bunker Hill by a ball which passed  
through his arm but he now receives a pension of forty eight  
Dollars as an invalid pensioner that his name has been placed on  
the pension list under the act of 1818 and dropped therefrom on  
account of his prosperity. And in pursuance of the act of the  
1st of May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen

of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that  
I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner  
disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby  
so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of  
the act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain  
persons engaged in the land and naval service of the  
United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18<sup>th</sup>  
day of March 1818. And that I have not nor had any person w/
