} On this 25th day of April A.D. 1818 before me the subscriber one of the judges of the Court of Common Pleas for said County personally appeared Heymouth Wallace aged sixty seven years resident in the Town of Sennarick County and State aforesaid who being by me first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress entitled An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war That he the said Heymouth Wallace in May 1775 enlisted in the Town of Epsom in said state for eight months and entered the aforesaid service in the company commanded by Captain Henry Dearborn and regiment commanded by Col John Stark New Hampshire line he continued to serve until June following when in the battle of Brimkerhill he was wounded and so much disabled that he did no more duty during said enlistment that sometime about the month of January 1776 he enlisted at winterhill for one year in the company regiment and line aforesaid that he continued to serve in said service of the United States in said

was on the continental establishment from January 1776 until
the last of December following or first of January 1777 when he
was dismissed from service at Annapolis in the state of New York
that he had no written discharge that he was in the battle of
Bunkerhill where he was wounded in consequence of which
wound he has since drawn a small pension from said
United States and that he is in reduced circumstances
and stands in need of the assistance of his country for
support — Sworn to and declared before me the day
and year aforesaid — William Badger

I William Badger Judge as aforesaid do certify that
it appears to my satisfaction that the said Heymouth Wallcut did
serve in the revolutionary war as stated in the preceding declaration
against the common enemy for the term of nine months on the Con-
tinental establishment and that he is in reduced circumstances and stands
in need of the assistance of his country for support and I now trans-
mit the proceedings and testimony taken and read before me
to the Secretary for the Department of War pursuant to the direc-
tions of the aforesaid act of Congress —

Weymouth Wallace aged 69 years, resident in Sandwich in said County, comes
into court, and in pursuance of an act of Congress passed on the 1st day of May, 1820, brings with him, and in his
proper person exhibits to said Court a Schedule by him subscribed, containing his whole Estate and Income, his
necessary clothing and bedding excepted—as follows:—

following oath by him duly taken and subscribed — viz.

I Weymouth Wallace do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the
18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my
property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an act
of Congress, entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United
States in the revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in
trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is con-
tained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

And the said Weymouth Wallace doth here in Court further declare on oath, that he served in the rev-
olutionary war as follows, viz.

nine months in Capt. Henry Dearborn's (since
Lieut. at war) Company and was wounded in the battle
of Pointe du Lac in year 1775 — one year in the Regiment
commanded by Col. John Stark and Company command-
ed by Capt. Oliver Chittenden, commencing in November
in December 1776 & ending 1777

That the date of his original declaration in order to obtain a pension is *April 25 1818* and the number of his pension certificate is *13,456* :—That his occupation is that of a *farmer & has not sufficient ability to perform it.*

That the number and names of his family residing with him, and their ages and capacities to contribute to their support, are as follows, viz.

*has one daughter named Sally Wallace aged 29 years
1 Grand daughter named Louisa Brown aged
21 years 1 Grand son aged 8 years in common health
but without any property.*

Wherefore he prays the opinion of the said Court as to the value of the property contained in the said schedule, and that the same, together with a copy of the premises be duly certified to the Secretary of War.

1829 Personally appeared in said Court being a Court of
Records for the County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire
Meymouth Wallace, a Resident in said County aged seventy seven
years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his
oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the p^{ro}-
-vision made by the acts of Congress of the 18th March 1818 and
the first of May 1820 that he the said Meymouth Wallace enlist-
ed for the term of nine months in May 1776 at Ipswich in the
State of New Hampshire in the company commanded by Captain
Amos Morrill in the Regiment Commanded Colonel John Stark
in the line of the State of New Hampshire on the continental establish-
-ment and at the expiration of said nine months he the said Mey-
mouth Wallace again enlisted for the further term of one year in the same
Company & Regiment in the line of the State of New Hampshire on the
Continental establishment and that he continued to serve in said corps
from the time of his first said enlistment until December 1777 when
he was discharged from the service in Lower Canada that he was
wounded in the Battle of Rattle Hill by a ball which passed
through his arm that he now receives a pension of forty eight
Dollars as an invalid pensioner that his name has been placed on
the pension list under the act of 1818 and dropped therefrom on
account of his profligacy. And in pursuance of the act of the
first of May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a rebel and citizen

of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift Sale or in any manner disposed of any property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of the act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818. And that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or Securities contract or debt due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed (to wit)
